LIVELY SCRAP OVER TITLE TO PROPERTY

Athens—Justice Johnson had a very interesting case before his court yesterday. F. A. Shoemaker resided in Athens for a long time, and they had a house and lot on Hugh street, the title of which was in his wife's name. Mrs. Shoemaker died several years ago, and the husband married again, and they continued to live in this house until Mr. Shoemaker died, about a year ago. Mr. Shoemaker made a will giving this house and lot to his second wife. A relative of the first Mrs. Shoemaker Mrs. A. J. Taylor and A. Downes now come forward and claim the property, stating that the present Mrs. Shoemaker has no title to it, and they visited the place for the purpose of getting possession, a short time ago. But Mrs. Shoemaker took a decided stand and refused to be ejected. The consequence was that there was a lively scrap, and now Mrs. Taylor and her counsel, S. H. Smith of Towanda, have arrested Mrs. Shoemaker and there is prospect of a very lively fight. Mrs. Shoemaker reeled off her story to Justice Johnson, showing her hand that had been injured in the battle, and wants the other party with her counsel arrested. The case was continued to Thursday afternoon as the Commonwealth were not ready to try the case. S. H. Smith of Towanda, and W. G. Schrier of Athens, are attorneys for the prosecution and J. T. Corbin for the defense.

ORDINANCE NO. 23.

Authorizing a contract to be entered into on the part of the Borough of South Waverly, County of Bradford and State of Pennsylvania, with the Waverly Electric Light and Power Company of the Village of Waverly, County of Tioga and State of New York, and authorizing and empowering the Burgess to sign the necessary contract on the part of the Borough of South Waverly. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of South Waverly, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same: Section 1. That the Borough of South Waverly enter into a contract with the Waverly Electric Light and Power Company for and during the term of five years from the first day of April, 1906, for 6 1/2 Amp. or 1200 nominal candle power arc lamps, at the price of \$55 per annum. Said lights to be kept lighted every night until one o'clock a. m. and 32 incandescent lamps to be lighted every night until one o'clock a. m., at \$20 per annum for each and every light. Section 2. The Burgess of the Borough of South Waverly is hereby authorized and empowered to sign the necessary contract with the said Waverly Electric Light and Power Company for the period of five years, dating from April 1, 1906, as soon as this ordinance becomes effective. The foregoing ordinance was duly passed at a regular meeting of the Borough Council of the Borough of South Waverly, Pa., June 5, 1906. JOHN V. QUICK, President of Council. T. M. WALSH, Secretary.
