Hold Fast at Latonia. CINCINNATI, June 13.—C. L. Railway's Hold Fast won the Harvard stakes for two year olds at five furlongs. The net value of the stake was \$1,005. Dutch Barbara was the only winning favorite.

Say Engineer Got \$3,000,000 Grant. CHICAGO, June 13.—The case of the government against Oberlin M. Carter, former army officer, was continued by Judge C. C. Kohlsaat, counsel for the government not being ready for the hearing. The charge against Carter is that while he was government engineer at Savannah, Ga., he embezzled over \$3,000,000 together with Green and Gaylor, contractors, recently found guilty. Carter is now being sued by the government for return of the money.

French Boat Canadian Fishing Boat. ST. JOHN'S, N. F., June 13.—The colonial government commissioned the whaler Scotia as an additional cruiser to enforce the fishing laws. She will operate along the west coast of Newfoundland between the Bay of Islands and Bellefleur strait, specially watching American fishing vessels. At St. Pierre French authorities seized the Canadian fishing schooner Winifred of Lunenburg for infraction of the fishing laws.

Vote For Greater Pittsburg. PITTSBURG, June 13.—With about half the districts reported, indications point to the carrying of the movement for a Greater Pittsburg by a big majority. At least 25,000 are estimated for Pittsburg. Allegheny rejected the measure by about 6,000 majority.

EDWARD HONORS US President's Daughter Sits Next to England's King. TOOK PRECEDENCE OF NOBILITY. Famous Men and Women of Britain Greet Our Alice and Her Husband at Whitehall—Red's Banquet in London.

At the banquet in honor of King and Queen, King Edward received the members of the embassy staff who did not attend the dinner. They were Craig W. Wadsworth, Grant Smith, Major John H. Beacom and Lieutenant Commander John H. Gibbons, accompanied by Miss Gibbons and Miss Carter.

The chief decorative feature of the Dorchester House dinner was a magnificent representation of the American eagle in white Italian marble. Mr. Reid procured the emblem awhile ago in Rome and placed it in position the other day in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Longworth. It will remain in Dorchester House during the remainder of Mr. Reid's tenancy and afterward will adorn his country house in America.

The banquet hall was elaborately decorated, crimson tulle roses being the feature. The entrance hall, the grand staircase and the terraces were a mass of gorgeous blooms. The table was decorated with flowers, softening the severity of Mr. Reid's splendid service of silver plate. The furniture is of gold upholstered in red. One of the features of the room is the fireplace, which is decorated by Stevens with beautiful allegorical feminine figures supporting the mantelpiece.

At the back of the house has been erected a large dining room in light green and white, fitted with electric tables and tables, the whole forming a handsome apartment, where supper was laid. The guests included the Earl of Granard, lord in waiting to the king, Major Jor George Lindsay Holford, emjery in waiting; the Duke of Richmond and Gordon, the Duke and Duchess of Buccleuch, the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough, Lord Tweedmouth, the Countess Frey, Lady Susan Townley, the Marquis and Marchioness of Lansdowne, Ambassador Gaitton, Admiral Fourrier, Lord and Lady Curzon, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Chamberlain, Mrs. Emma Cannon, Oden Mills, Mrs. Riggaley Carter, secretary of the American embassy, and Mrs. Carter and Belanzy Jay, private secretary to Ambassador Reid.

The cabin in which Abraham Lincoln was born in 1793 arrived last night and was viewed by hundreds of school children, members of the G. A. R. and patriotic citizens. After the celebration the cabin will be taken to the Lincoln farm in Laramie county, Ky. The farm is being converted into a national park by the Lincoln Farm association.
