ELECTRIC CARS IN SMASHUP
Waverly—This morning about 6:30 one of the large cars, No. 17, was running west on Broad street when the trolley flew off. The motorman put on the airbrakes and stopped it quickly. Car No. 2 was following rather closely and running at such a rapid rate that the motorman was unable to stop it and it crashed into the car ahead. All the glass and the sash in the end of No. 17 was broken. No. 2, however, was even worse, the whole front end being smashed in. The controller crashed back through the door and the brake rigging was put out of commission. The front car telescoped into the rear car. The motorman of the rear car tried to get out but was unable to do so, and his escape from injury was marvelous.
