A special meeting of the fire board will be held at the borough building Thursday evening at which business of importance will be acted upon. All members are requested to attend.

## ADJOURNED MEETING OF SCHOOL BOARD

Was Held Last Night in the High School Building—Teachers Appointed and Other Business Transacted

A regular adjourned meeting of the Sayre borough school directors was held in the high school building last night for the purpose of appointing teachers for the ensuing year and transacting other important business.

The board was in session until a late hour, and as there was still a large amount of business to be closed up before the next regular meeting in July, adjournment was taken until next Monday evening, at which time janitors for the buildings will be appointed and their salaries fixed.

The tax rate for the present year was fixed at ten mills for school purposes and two mills for building purposes.

The bond of Director Maddock, who was elected treasurer at the last meeting of the board, was fixed at \$30,000. F. E. Lyford, M. H. Sawtelle and M. P. Murray qualifying as bondsmen.

Directors Whittle, Maddock and Cook were appointed a committee to secure a teacher for the high school in the place of Miss Anna Dunlap who has tendered her resignation.

September 4 was named as the date on which the schools will reopen for the fall term.

A motion was made and carried declaring the seat occupied by James Adam from the second ward vacant. There is a provision in the school law to the effect that where a director fails to attend two meetings of the board without reasonable excuse his office shall be declared vacant by the board. It appeared last night that Mr. Adam during the past six months has failed to attend any of the meetings so the board took action last night and removed him from office. Grant Hutchinson was appointed to fill out Mr. Adam's unexpired term.

The board also elected all the old teachers who had made applications for positions for the next school year. Many of them asked for increase in salary and in some instances the increase was granted. Several new teachers were also appointed to positions.

The town hall committee met last night and considered the preliminary plans. John Hammond and James Lines, representing the fire board, were present and suggested several changes to meet the requirements of the firemen. The plans were changed in several particulars and will now be sent to the architects, who will make a permanent set.

## FRACTURED SHOULDER BONE

Edward Shamp, an employe of Hart's planing mill, suffered a fracture of the left scapula bone yesterday afternoon while working a machine for making lath. The bolt flew out of the machine and struck him in the back knocking him against a fellow workman and both fell to the ground. Shamp was taken to the hospital where the fracture was reduced. His companion was unajured.

## MIAL COULD NOT ATTEND CONFERENCE

It Was Held This Afternoon but the Gentleman from the Fourteenth Has Business at Washington

The Republican conferees of Bradford, Wayne and Wyoming counties met at Susquehanna this afternoon to select a candidate for member of congress from the fourteenth congressional district. Hon. Mial E. Lilley is a candidate from Bradford county. He wired to the conference yesterday that he would be unable to attend the conference as his presence was needed in Washington to vote against the objectionable clause relating to the issuing of passes in the railroad bill. Mr. Lilley, however, knows that there is no way of defeating his nomination as the conferees were all named by him. Had there been any doubt as to the outcome of the conference the Hon. Mial would have been on deck with a cold deck up his sleeve ready to circumvent any move that might have been made against him. As it is, however, the gentleman from the fourteenth will stay on his job, vote against the pass clause in the railroad bill, and then next fall point to his record with pride. This man Mial is a very clever artist, but unfortunately for him the great majority of the voters are next to his little dodges.

Will Spend One Year at Hard Labor for Burglary Committed at Waverly

In county court at Owego yesterday Howard Ferris of Sayre was sentenced to Auburn prison for one year at hard labor, he having pleaded guilty to burglary committed at Waverly some four weeks ago. His companion in crime, McHale, was sent to the Elmira Reformatory. Both young men were caught robbing business places in Waverly. They had the goods on them when they fell into the hands of the police. Ferris has been mixed up in several petty offenses here in Sayre, and the police have been troubled with him considerably. By many the lad is thought to be somewhat mentally unbalanced, as the manner in which he has done many things does not show the cunning of the natural criminal.
