Waverly—The Italians had a glorious time celebrating Saint Antonio's day yesterday. They had a parade in the morning, followed by a service at St. James church. In the afternoon there was some speech making, followed by a larger parade than that of the morning. Some daylight fireworks were shot off during the afternoon and in the evening a display of fire works took place at the corner of Broad and Johnson streets.

A vast crowd gathered and the streets were thronged with people in the evening. The Italians conducted themselves in an orderly manner and caused no trouble whatever. There did not appear to be a quarrelsome person among them. Those in charge were disappointed in not having more bands in the parade. The celebration was a success financially, and about \$60 remains in the treasury.
