HORTON DEAN WAS VICTIM OF ASSAULT

Is Alleged to Have Referred to a Negro in a Disrespectful Manner and the Latter Hit Him

Horton Dean, a farmer who resides near Troy, was taken to the hospital yesterday afternoon suffering from what was at first believed to have been a fracture at the base of the brain. Horton came to Sayre yesterday morning, it is said, for the purpose of going to the hospital for medical treatment, he having been operated upon at that institution some time ago. Instead of going to the hospital, however, it is alleged that he became intoxicated. Between three and four o'clock he was in the Wilbur house barroom where Josh White, the colored porter and an assistant were engaged in hanging a screen on the door which opens from the barroom to Packer avenue. Dean is alleged to have passed through the door, and as he did so he made an offensive remark to White, referring in a disrespectful manner to the latter's color. When Dean started to go out of the room he repeated the remark, and it is alleged that White struck the man a blow on the side of the head which sent him reeling down the stone steps to the pavement a few feet below. Dean struck on the side of his head inflicting a serious injury. Chief Walsh was in the vicinity and he notified Dr. Higgins. When the doctor arrived he found Dean lying unconscious on the sidewalk and blood was gushing from the wound in his head. It was at first believed that the man was dead, after a few minutes work on the part of the physician he was restored to consciousness, and was removed to the hospital. The doctors at that institution say that the man is quite badly hurt but that they do not fear serious results.

CIRCUS CONTRACTS WERE MADE TODAY

Arrangements Completed for the Appearance of the Barnum & Bailey Show Here on August 24th

R. M. Harvey, contracting agent for the Barnum & Bailey circus, was in Sayre this morning arranging for the appearance of the circus in this place on August 24. The lot on North Elmer avenue above the school building was secured, contracts for water were made with the water company, and Burgess Cross was interviewed regarding the license. Thompson & Price will furnish a large amount of feed and grain for the animals, including 250 bushels of oats. This latter item will give some idea as to the size of the circus, which is conceded by everyone to be the largest on earth. As it will be the first time that this circus has ever visited this valley thousands of people may be expected in Sayre on that date. It is understood that the circus will not appear at Towanda.

JACKET TORN FROM HIS BODY

Fred Lambert Had an Exceedingly Narrow Escape from Serious Injury Yesterday

Fred Lambert, an employe of the Lehigh Valley machine shops, narrowly escaped serious injury and perhaps death yesterday afternoon while operating one of the lathes which is run by an electric motor. Lambert wore a loose fitting jacket and it became entangled in the machine which was moving rapidly. In an instant the jacket was stripped from his body, and he was thrown against the machine lacerating his neck and bruising his shoulders and arms in several places. A fuse connected with the motive power fortunately blew out and stopped the machine before any further damage was done. Lambert went to the office of Dr. C. J. Cummings, where his injuries were attended to.

ONE MAN WHIPS FIVE

Last night an east side bartender accompanied by two women, were walking along East Packer avenue near the eastern approach to the bridge, when they were accosted by four or five young men who are said to have made insulting remarks and at the same time expressed a willingness to slay the bartender. The bartender led the woman to a place of safety and returned to the place where the young fellows had assembled. The bartender waded into the gang, and is said to have cleaned up the entire bunch in short order. One of the young men is said to have been quite roughly handled. There will be no arrests as every one connected with the affray is apparently satisfied.

BLACK BASS SEASON

The black bass season officially opens on Saturday next. The Chemung and Susquehanna rivers will not be in good shape for fishing, however, as the recent rains have swollen both streams, and will take at least another week for them to clear sufficiently to make the fishing good. It is unlawful to take bass from the water under ten inches in length.

PUGILISTS HERE

Terry Edwards of Brooklyn and Tommy Barry of Chicago, both pugilists, are in Sayre today endeavoring to make arrangements for a boxing exhibition. Both men have been with Robert Fitzsimmons in his various trips throughout the country, and Edwards, who weighs 118 pounds, will be prepared to meet all comers.

LILLEY'S SPEECH ON THE RATE BILL

Congressman From This District Opposes the Clause Which Prohibits Transportation Being Furnished Railroad Employes

The Record is in receipt of a communication from Congressman Mial E. Lilley enclosing an extract from his speech on the railroad rate bill. The extract referred to is as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I would be glad, indeed, if this house today and in this hour could put the seal of its disapproval on that clause in this bill which says that railroad employes and their families cannot be furnished free transportation by their employer. How it came in this bill I do not know, but this I do know, that if it was put in in good faith the man who placed it there forgot the engineer leaving far out in the cab with his eye on the rail all night, and the passenger asleep, and sleeping because he knew the man was there. He forgot the rear brakeman, who often stands out in the storm with the thermometer below zero, guarding the rear of the train, while he sleeps because he knows the man is there. I would be glad if we could put the seal of our disapproval upon that clause now. I find no fault with the leadership which says this is not the proper time, but I shall find fault, and I shall not vote for the bill, if that clause is not eliminated. Fully one fourth of the residents of my districts are directly affected by this bill. And I ask you now, I ask my friends on my side of the house, and while I am here on the Cherokee strip, upon the other side, I ask you not to place us in the position of going home to our constituents with having even to vote upon such a proposition, and I ask the conferees when it gets back to them to see to it that it is taken out."

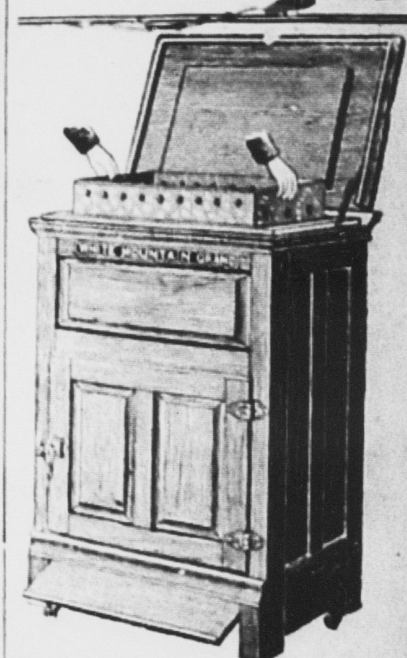
