ELOPING COUPLE STOPPED IN SAYRE

Girl Was Only Fifteen, While Her Male Companion Was Twenty-Two

On Tuesday night a young man apparently 22 years old, accompanied by a girl, who it is thought was not more than 15, stopped at one of the hotels in Sayre and the former went to the register and wrote thereon: "Mr. and Mrs. J. Lindley, Hartford, N. Y." The couple were assigned a room for the night and the next morning they went to the Lehigh station and the man purchased tickets for Easton, Pa. Yesterday Deputy Sheriff Kinney of Tompkins county, N. Y., came to Sayre in search of the couple, when it developed that the pair had eloped from Hartford. The deputy sheriff failed to give the correct names of either the man or the girl, but said that they had run away from Hartford, probably with the intention of getting married. The deputy sheriff said that the girl was between 14 and 15 years of age and was the member of a respectable family, while the young man had always borne a good reputation. They had been keeping company for some time but on account of the extreme youth of the girl the parents of the latter had discouraged the young man's visits. Deputy Sheriff Kinney returned to Ithaca, and whether the couple will be chased any farther is not known.

LEHIGH TIME INSPECTOR

Webb C. Ball has been appointed general time inspector for the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, and has already assumed the duties of his office. It is the intention of the Lehigh officials to be more exact in the future regarding the watches carried by employees. It is said that many of the Lehigh's men take watches belonging to other men to the local examiners, and by this fraudulent method are able to carry a card certifying that their timepieces are up to the standard grade. Under the new regime the Lehigh will require a semi-annual inspection, once during January and again in July. Further than this all employees will be required to take their watches to local examiners where they will be compared with semi-annual inspection cards. This method will put a stop to borrowing watches for inspection purposes.

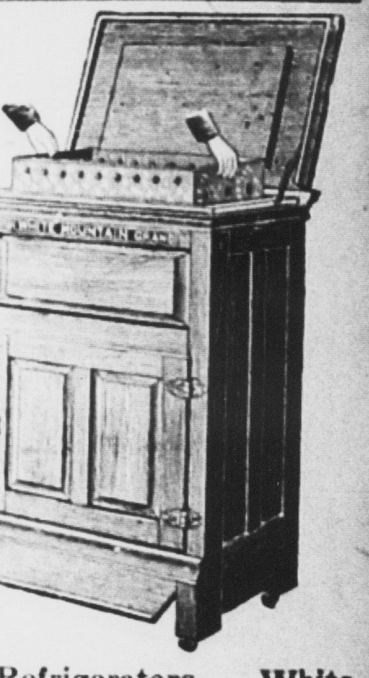
