## STEVENS AND MOSCRIP WIN THE CONTEST

Selected by Overwhelming Majorities as Candidates on the Republican Ticket for Members of Assembly

The Republican primaries held throughout Bradford county on Saturday resulted in the selection of Dr. C. L. Stevens of Athens and George A. Moscrip of Towanda as candidates for the assembly. Both gentlemen have been nominated by handsome majorities, completely distancing their rivals, Hoyt, Tuton and Coons. A large vote was cast in the majority of districts and great interest was manifested in the contest. Stevens polled the largest vote, with Moscrip a close second. Hoyt, Tuton and Coons were literally snowed under.

The result for jury commissioner is somewhat in doubt, as many of the rural districts have not been heard from. So far as the returns have been received today, S. A. Blish, the candidate from Sayre, is slightly in the lead, with excellent prospects of winning out at the finish. The nomination of Mr. Blish will probably come before the delegates at the convention to be held on Thursday next at Towanda. It is quite likely that Moscrip's case will also come before the convention as he appears to lack a few votes of a majority over all.

A big vote was cast in the four wards of Sayre borough, and handsome majorities were given for Stevens and Moscrip. Blish for jury commissioner also received a big vote in his home town.

The result of the primaries is a decisive victory for the anti Lilleyites. Hoyt was a Lilley candidate and his defeat means the complete downfall of the wily boss, who has for the last time posed as leader in Bradford county politics.

The Bishop spoke eloquently and left a profound impression upon his auditors.

## JUMPED FROM TRAIN FELL THROUGH BRIDGE

Michael Clary Met With a Serious Serious Accident Near Van Etten on Saturday Night

On Saturday night Michael Clary, of Van Etten, and well known in Sayre, jumped from the caboose of a Lehigh freight train near the former place, and by a miscalculation as to the locality he was in, plunged downward through a bridge which crosses a wagon road, to the hard ground, a distance of nearly twenty five feet, breaking his right arm and shoulder and badly lacerating his head and back.

The accident occurred shortly before midnight. Mr. Clary acts as an extra ticket agent for the Lehigh, and on Saturday he had been working for the company at Dushore, filling the place of the regular day agent, who was absent. He returned to Sayre on 157 and in the afternoon called on his brother Daniel Clary, the coal dealer, and also transacted other business. Late Saturday night he boarded the caboose of a freight train for Van Etten as has been his frequent custom. As the train neared Van Etten the engineer slowed up in order to give Mr. Clary an opportunity to get off. The night was dark and it is presumed that Mr. Clary got mixed as to the locality. He went to the rear platform and jumped off, an act which would be safely undertaken under ordinary circumstances. But instead of landing on the ground along side the tracks Clary dropped off directly on top of a bridge. There is an open space between the tracks on the bridge and he fell through this opening, landing on the ground below on his head and shoulders.

A trainman discovered the mistake that Clary had made and the train was stopped and the train's crew went to his assistance. He was found lying on the ground seriously hurt. So extensive was his injuries it was at once decided to remove him to the hospital at this place. An engine and caboose were sent for but on account of a compound engine being off the track near the State Line tower, it was not until after six o'clock that he arrived at the hospital.

Although his injuries are not of a fatal nature it will be some time before he is able to leave the hospital. The fact that he was not killed outright is regarded as miraculous.

Mr. Clary is well known in Sayre where he has many friends who will wish him a speedy recovery.

## CONDUCTOR THOMAS SERIOUSLY INJURED

Air Hose Broke and He Was Thrown Against the Caboose Stove

Albert F. Thomas, one of the oldest and best known freight conductors on the Lehigh, met with a serious accident in the Sayre yards yesterday morning, and it is feared that his injuries are of an internal nature.

Thomas was standing in the caboose of his train which had just pulled into the Sayre yards from the east, when the air hose broke about five cars from the engine. This caused the rear portion of the train to stop instantly. Mr. Thomas was thrown against the stove of the caboose, and two other trainmen were also knocked down and sustained slight injuries. As soon as they recovered themselves, however, they went to Mr. Thomas' assistance and found that he had been seriously injured. The accident happened almost directly in front of the station. A stretcher was quickly secured and the injured conductor was removed to the baggage room and in the meantime a telephone message was sent for the ambulance.

At the hospital it was discovered that Mr. Thomas had sustained a fracture of two ribs and the surgeons fear that broken end of one of them has punctured the lungs. He is resting comfortably today, however, and it is hoped that he will recover.

Conductor Thomas, who was formerly a chief of the fire department, and one of the most enthusiastic members that the department ever had, has been exceedingly unfortunate during the past year. Last summer while assisting in taking a hose cart to a fire, he was run over on the western approach to the Packer avenue bridge and badly injured. He was taken to his home and it was months before he was able to return to his work. His many friends among the railroad men and citizens of Sayre will hope for his speedy recovery from yesterday's accident.
