STREET PROPOSITION LAID ON THE TABLE

Several Taxpayers Petition for the Street—Trustees Argued the Matter at Some Length

Waverly—The board of trustees held a special meeting last evening at which every member was present, and again considered the matter of the new street to connect Chemung and Ithaca streets. A petition signed by several taxpayers in the vicinity asking for the street, was presented and read, and a number of citizens spoke for and against the street.

Trustee Howard spoke at some length against the street, stating that he did not consider the need commensurate to the cost, and that the village should spend the money in improving other streets that had been accepted and on which people had erected houses under the implied contract that they would be improved.

Trustee Lang stated that he was against the street because in conversation with taxpayers he was convinced that the majority were against it, and he thought that he had no right to spend their money in direct contravention to their wishes. He moved, therefore, to lay the matter on the table until the next regular meeting, to give them time to further determine the wishes of the taxpayers in the matter.

After a rather amusing exchange of pleasantries between Mr. Farley and Mr. Lang, the motion to put the resolution over was carried.

REPAIRS COMPLETED

Waverly—The trustees met in the trustee room last night for the first time since the repairs were begun. The room has been furnished in elegant style and is well worth a visit.

It has been wainscoted and cased up with quartered oak which has been given a fine finish. A seat across one end and part way down each side is very much appreciated by the spectators. 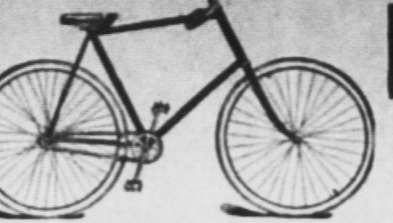
RENDERED UNCONSCIOUS

ORDINANCE NO. 23.

Authorizing a contract to be entered into on the part of the Borough of South Waverly, County of Bradford and State of Pennsylvania, with the Waverly Electric Light and Power Company of the Village of Waverly, County of Tioga and State of New York, and authorizing and empowering the Burgess to sign the necessary contract on the part of the Borough of South Waverly.

Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of South Waverly, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same:

Section 1. That the Borough of South Waverly enter into a contract with the Waverly Electric Light and Power Company for and during the term of five years from the first day of April, 1906, for 60 Amp. or 1200 nominal candle power arc lamps, at the price of \$55 per annum. Said lights to be kept lighted every night until one o'clock a. m., and 22 incandescent lamps to be lighted every night until one o'clock a. m., at \$20 per annum for each and every light.

Section 2. The Burgess of the Borough of South Waverly is hereby authorized and empowered to sign the necessary contract with the said Waverly Electric Light and Power Company for the period of five years, dating from April 1, 1906, as soon as this ordinance becomes effective.

The foregoing ordinance was duly passed at a regular meeting of the Borough Council of the Borough of South Waverly, Pa., June 5, 1906.
