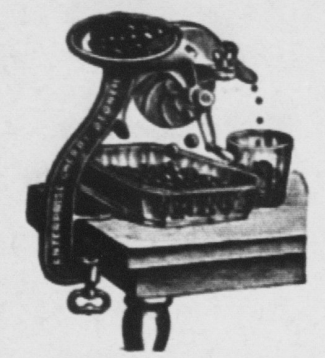

EXPENSIVE WRECK ON THE LEHIGH

Rear End Collision at Slatington in Which One Man Was Seriously Injured

Apple Jack took a mile south of Slatington, was the scene of a costly wreck on the Lehigh Valley early yesterday morning. One engine was demolished, several freight cars were smashed into an unrecognizable mass, and at least one man was fatally injured.

An extra freight train running from Mauch Chunk to Jersey City had just taken water at the tank and was starting to pull out when a cannon ball freight from the south crashed into the rear. The impact was terrific and the wreckage which followed was frightful. In the caboose of the extra freight train were Conductor Sylvester Decker of Lehigh and Flagman John Herr of Slatington. Both men were buried under the debris and when taken out were more dead than alive. The locomotive of the cannon ball was thrown to one side and completely dismantled. The crew jumped and escaped injury.

The wreck resulted in a loss estimated at \$50,000.00.

ORDERED OUT OF TOWN

Joe Eckhart, who was arrested yesterday afternoon by Chief Walsh on a charge of drunkenness and disorderly conduct, was given a hearing last night, and ordered to shake the dust of Sayre from his feet within fifteen minutes. The time had scarcely elapsed when he was rearrested by Officers Walsh and Vogel. This time he protested vehemently and his boisterous talk attracted a large crowd. Eckhart is the most disreputable character with which the police have had to deal in some time. He claims Elmira as his residence and said that he came to Sayre several days ago. What little money he has earned since coming to this place has been spent for whiskey, and he has been arrested three times, being discharged in each instance on promising to get out of town. This morning Eckhart was given another hearing and was again ordered out of town. He lost no time but made his way in the direction of Athens as fast as his legs could carry him.

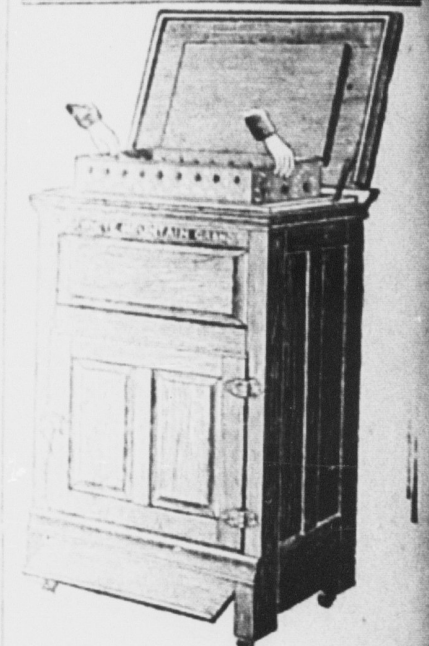
