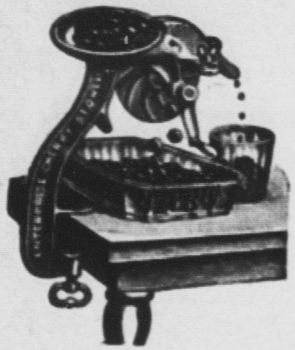

SEWER COMMITTEE MET LAST NIGHT

A Definite Report Will Probably Be Submitted to the Council at Its Next Meeting

The sewer plans for Sayre borough, which were referred to the state health department for approval, were returned the fore part of the week and a meeting of the sewer committee was held last night for the purpose of discussing the matter. The plans have been approved by the department and consent has also been gained to empty into the Susquehanna river. The members of the council were given an invitation to attend the meeting held by the committee last night. The sewer question is a most important one and the members of the committee feel that they have assumed considerable responsibility, therefore it was deemed advisable to ask the other members of the council to be present when the matter came up for discussion and explain to them any of the details not thoroughly understood. Nearly all the councilmen were present and the matter was given a thorough hearing and an exhaustive explanation. The committee will be in a position to report at the next regular meeting, which will be held the first Monday evening in July. Just what the report will be the committee is not at this time in a position to give out for publication, as it is incumbent upon the members to make their first report to the council. It is believed, however, that the committee will make a report which will in every way meet with the approval of the council and of the people. The gentlemen comprising the committee have worked hard on the project for the past year. The proposition in its various phases has been at times perplexing and has involved no end of hard work. The committee, however, has been diligent and painstaking and it is hoped that whatever their decision is in the matter it will meet with the approbation of the citizens of Sayre.

FINED \$25 FOR VIOLATING FISH LAW

Game Warden on Deck in the Early Hours of the Morning

For several days Harry LaPlant, Ray Sterling, John Lowe and Frank Carroll have been camping on Tioga Point. Previous to going into camp they consulted an attorney, who advised them as to their rights to fish under the game laws. For two or three nights the young men had an outline in the Susquehanna river. The law permits setting an outline, provided the same is placed in water after sunset at night and taken out before sunrise in the morning. The boys observed the rule rigidly until yesterday morning, when after having been up nearly all night watching the line, they fell asleep and did not awaken in time to get the line out of the water before sunrise. Game Warden Shoemaker "happened" to be in the vicinity, and seeing the line in the water in violation of the law, placed the boys under arrest, and told them that it would cost \$25 to settle with the outraged majesty of the law. As the boys did not have this amount with them, Harry LaPlant came to Sayre and succeeded in raising the money. Returning to camp he says that he gave the money to Shoemaker and the boys were released.

The young men say that they offered to go before a magistrate and plead guilty to having the line in the water, but that Shoemaker told them they could settle in that manner.
