Athens—The Christian Endeavor Union convention closed with a meeting last evening and its principles have been enthused by so much of christian energy that each delegate will return to their homes with new determination to work for its advancement. The address by Rev. Edwin F. Hallenbeck D. D. of Binghamton, was one of those earnest heart to heart talks that reaches deep into the affections of every listener, and he was listened to with breathless attention all through his discourse. Mr. Hallenbeck stated that his official duties in his own state demanded so much of his attention that he had found no opportunity to cross the line into Pennsylvania before, but he felt when he faced the audience this evening that there was the same earnest christian spirit apparent as he had met with in his own state.
