ANNUAL MEETING OF HOSPITAL TRUSTEES

It Was Held Yesterday and Was Largely Attended

The annual meeting of the board of trustees of the Robert Packer hospital, which was held at that institution yesterday, was largely attended, over two thirds of the 36 trustees being present. A large amount of business, including the adoption of the annual report of the treasurer, was transacted and there were many questions that came up for consideration which were of a highly interesting nature.

The twenty-first annual report of treasurer for the year ending May 31, 1906, is an interesting document. The report shows that the ladies' auxiliaries have collected \$1,184.48 for the year, while the receipts from other sources including those paid by patients for board and services, and the state appropriation make a total of \$27,157.32. The disbursements for the year were \$28,338.83, leaving a deficit of \$1,181.01.

The resignation of R. W. Baxter, one of the trustees, was read and accepted. David J. Pearsall of Mauch Chunk, was nominated and elected a trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Baxter.

F. J. Taylor, secretary of the Business Men's Association of Sayre, was elected secretary of the board, to fill the vacancy caused by the absence of F. J. Krom, who has recently been called to Michigan.

Dr. H. S. Fish, a former interne at the hospital, who has since located in Sayre for the practice of his profession, was selected as assistant to the surgeon in chief.

Other matters pertaining to the conduct of the hospital came up for discussion, among them being the report that recently went out concerning the ladies auxiliaries. It appears that the impression has been given out that the hospital is not in need of funds at the present time and that the money raised by the auxiliary societies should be used for an endowment fund to support a training class for nurses. Under the present regime the money collected by these societies is used for maintenance purposes, each auxiliary being entitled to the use of a bed every day in the year provided \$300 is contributed by the society. But as above stated, it seems there has been a suggestion to interfere with this plan and use the various funds for endowment purposes. The trustees discussed the question yesterday, and after the financial status of the hospital had been fully explained it was agreed that the present method of applying the auxiliary fund should be continued.

The hospital is in need of funds at all times. At the present time there is an outstanding indebtedness of \$7,296.00, which, with a deficit in the maintenance fund, makes it absolutely essential that everyone who is interested in the success of the institution should be ready and willing to stand their share of the burden.

MYSTERIOUS ACCIDENT

When No. 4 pulled into the local station today the car inspectors discovered that a gas tank on one of the coaches had met with an accident, but just what caused it remains a mystery. The end of the tank had been smashed in, evidently by striking some solid object. The damage was so extensive that the tank was put out of commission and the car will go through to its destination without gas.

EXTRA EXAMINATIONS

In addition to those examinations already advertised two extra examinations for teacher's certificates will be held at the high school in Towanda July 13 and 14, and August 11 and 12. The morning sessions of these examinations will begin at 8 o'clock.

INSPECTED NEW TOWN HALL PLANS

Council Committee Well Pleased With the Progress Made by the Architects

The town hall committee of the borough council, composed of Messrs. West, Ellis and Adamy, went to Elmira yesterday to confer with the architects, Pierce & Bickford, regarding the plans which are now being prepared. The committee was accompanied by John Hammond, representing the fire department, and the plans so far as completed were inspected in detail. The committee decided that the roof of the new hall should be of the French mansard plan and the architects were instructed to prepare the plans accordingly. Other details were slightly changed, and the committee returned home feeling satisfied that when the plans are completed, which will be in about three weeks, that the matter will be in first class shape to present to the borough council.

It has not yet been fully determined whether or not to provide for a fireproof building. Two sets of plans, however, will be submitted to the council, from which a choice can be made. It would seem that no difficulty should be encountered in determining this matter. The slight extra cost of a fireproof building will be paid for in a few years by the saving made on insurance, and will be much more satisfactory in the end.

THE STREET FAIR

Beginning on Monday, July 9, and continuing through the entire week, the American Amusement and Carnival Company will conduct a street fair in Sayre for the benefit of the entire fire department. The company is the largest traveling carnival company on the road, and consists of 12 tent shows, two merry-go-rounds, a ferris wheel, the house upside down, and a large list of smaller attractions. The grounds on lower Desmond street will probably be secured, and as the proceeds are to go to the fire department every one should attend.

Frank Everett Nevin, editor of the Sayre Daily Times, left last night for Elyria, Ohio, where his marriage to Miss Edith J. Sherwood took place at noon today in the Church of Christ at that place. Mr. Nevin and his bride, after a short wedding trip, including a visit to Buffalo and Niagara Falls, will return to Sayre, where they will reside on Hayden street. Mr. Nevin became the editor of the Times last October and has gained a wide acquaintance and many friends during his stay in Sayre. The Record extends congratulations.

LYNN CONKLIN DIED SUDDENLY

Succumbs to an Attack of Acute Stomach Trouble Shortly After Retiring Last Night

Lynn Conklin, 33 years old, who has conducted a small harness shop on East Lockhart street for several months, died suddenly last night, and the physician who was called attributes death to an acute attack of stomach trouble, with which the deceased had been afflicted for some time.

Mr. Conklin has been in ill health for the past five years and was compelled to cease work as a boilermaker at the Lehigh shops. Last fall he started a harness shop on East Lockhart street. He and his wife occupied rooms over the harness store, but recently she has been at the home of her parents in Elmira. Yesterday, however, at his request she returned home, finding him apparently feeling better than usual. Shortly after they retired last night Mr. Conklin threw his arm heavily over his wife's neck. She noticed that something was wrong and began rubbing him. As this did no good a doctor was sent for and when he arrived he pronounced the man dead.

The deceased was born in New Jersey but his early life was spent in Eliston. He learned the boilermaker's trade and worked at it until ill health compelled him to give it up five years ago.

Short funeral services will be conducted at 7 o'clock this evening at the home of Mrs. Emma Stimpson of East Lockhart street, and the remains will be taken to Elmira tomorrow morning for burial.
