There is a deep devotional spirit manifest that becomes a medium for the expression of all the belief and all they hope for, and to them it is a sacred institution. Mrs. Moody took us into the homes and hearts of these people last evening and gave us a very interesting account of them. She has the dialect and mannerisms under perfect control, and her selections were such as to display every feature of their life and conversation. She possesses a fine voice and some of the musical interpretations were indeed wonderful. There was a good and appreciative audience in attendance and the fact that they listened spellbound for an hour and a half is sufficient attestation that the entertainment was one of rare excellence.
