## FINISHED TAKING EVIDENCE YESTERDAY

**Attorneys Are Arguing the Eighmey Lunacy Case This Afternoon**

The Eighmey lunacy commission held another meeting yesterday afternoon and finished taking evidence. Mrs. Jesse Bell, Thomas Gaumer, John Brundage, Charles Osborn and Mr. Andrews, the latter an aged and retired blacksmith of Athens, were sworn by the attorneys for Mr. Eighmey. Lawrence Eighmey, a brother of the respondent, also testified. In the opinion of these witnesses Mr. Eighmey is sane and capable of transacting business. This afternoon the commission is listening to the arguments of counsel on both sides, and it is expected that the matter will be finally closed up. It is not likely that the commission will render a decision at once as the question which the members are called upon to determine is a most important one, and will therefore of necessity require considerable deliberation.

The work of the commission has been arduous and exacting. Five sessions have been held and a large number of witnesses have been examined, including many physicians from Sayre, Athens and Waverly. The commission will be called upon to determine whether or not Mr. Eighmey is sane or insane. If it should be established to their satisfaction that he is sane, the matter then stands as it did before the proceedings of inquiry were started; should, however, the commission adjudge him insane, then it will be necessary to decide whether it is of a nature that requires his restraint. The law fixes the manner of restraint, and is not a matter for the commission to determine.

## HEED THE WARNING

Next Wednesday is the Fourth of July and although there will be no public celebration in Sayre, firecrackers, rockets Roman candles and explosives of all kinds will doubtless be much in evidence. Sayre lads are already planning for the big time they are to have on the Fourth, and the danger attending the use of toy pistols and other explosives, cannot be too firmly impressed upon the minds of parents. The State Health department has already sent out warning notices, and advise that in the case of accident a physician be sent for at once. Lockjaw, or as the medical fraternity term it, tetanus, is likely to follow even the slightest wound. The germ which causes it makes rapid progress, once it enters the system, and parents should therefore heed the warning in case their little ones are in any way injured.

## "SPIKE" KINNER

County Commissioner L. J. Marsh, came to Sayre today to make inquiry into the case of "Spike" Kinner, for whom an order of relief was granted by the local justices on Monday last. Kinner is believed to be suffering from mental aberration of the mind, brought about by the continued use of intoxicants. This afternoon a commission consisting of Dr. C. A. Haines and Dr. A. H. Murray, examined Kinner, and after deliberation pronounced him insane and ordered that he be taken to Danville for treatment. He will be taken to the hospital at that place tomorrow by the county commissioners.

## EXPENSIVE SHOT

A Wellsboro lad fired off a cannon firecracker on the streets of that borough. An officer arrested him, charging a violation of a borough ordinance. The lad was taken before a magistrate, and in addition to a fine of \$1.00 he paid \$2.75 costs. The cost of the cracker, added to the fine and costs of arrest made it rather an expensive shot.

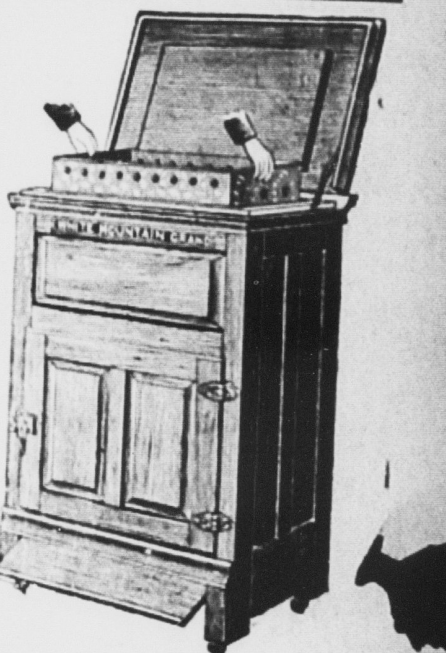
