SEVERELY INJURED

Athens—Mrs. A. R. Brown was driving their carriage horse yesterday afternoon and went into Bridge street to the watering trough, when some fellow drove in from Elmira street, whipping his horses and making a tremendous noise. This so frightened Mrs. Brown's horse that he ran against a telephone pole at the southeast corner of the street and Mrs. Brown was thrown out of the buggy and sustained severe injuries. Her horse continued to run down Bridge street to the river and from there up to North street, where Chief Mulligan captured him. Mr. Brown is looking for the fellow who caused the trouble.

OPENED FIRE ON CROWD.

Pennsylvania Constabulary in Fight With Allentown Strikers. ALLENTOWN, Pa. June 27.—A platoon of the state constabulary which is on duty in this city in connection with the street car strike fired into a crowd last night and injured a boy.

The police were riding past Fourth and Hamilton streets when they were greeted with yells by a large crowd congregated at that point. Two of the state policemen arrested two men and started with them for the jail, half a block away. A crowd of 2,000 persons, attracted by the shooting, quickly gathered, and stones were thrown at the state police. The helmet of E. Markant, a state policeman, was smashed with a brick. In the melee that followed one of the arrested men escaped.

The police, being hard pressed by the crowd that was following them, turned and fired a shot into the air and then shot low. A bullet struck Harry R. Winkle, a thirteen-year-old boy, in the leg, and he was taken to a hospital. Chief of Police Bower and several city policemen arrived at the jail as the state police brought in their remaining prisoner, and two troopers who were accused of doing the shooting were held up. Charges will be preferred against them for shooting.

The crowd was highly incensed at the action of the state police. There is a deep prejudice against the presence here of the state constabulary. Very few cars are running, the company not having enough men to keep up their usual service. Guards of state constabulary are on each car, and others are on horseback patrolling points where danger is anticipated.

GIFT TO WARSHIP.

Colonial Dances Present the Virginia With Handsome Silver Service. NORFOLK, Va. June 28.—The handsome silver service given by the Colonial Dames of America in Virginia to the battleship Virginia was presented at the Norfolk navy yard in the presence of a large assemblage of dames from various parts of Virginia, headed by Mrs. Ruffin Cox of Richmond, president of the society in this state.

The presentation was through J. Alston Cabell and J. Lawrence Campbell of Richmond. Mr. Campbell making the speech. The acceptance was by Captain Schroeder, commanding the Virginia.

The silver service is unique. It is in three pieces, the center piece taking the form of an oval shaped bowl or epergne and the side pieces being electric candelabras.

The epergne rests upon a block of ebony with a silver base and has adjustable parts for cut flowers and fruits. Applied in relief on one side is the seal of Virginia, and on the other side is the seal of the United States navy department. A silver tablet on the front bears the inscription:

Presented by the Society of Colonial Dames of America in the state of Virginia. The name gives warrant of heroic deeds.

Demands of the Men Show Unity Was Worked by Revolutionists.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 28.—The commander of the ultra loyal Preobrajeny regiment, to which belong the men who recently held a meeting in defiance of orders in the guard camp at Krasnoye Selo and drew up resolutions addressed to their commander upholding all the actions of parliament and declaring that they want no more police duty entailing the slaying of brother or father, has been severely reprimanded by the emperor. The reprimanding is the first and most honored regiment in the Russian service is the clearest comment possible on the serious spread of the revolutionary propaganda in the army. The Preobrajeny is the oldest regiment of the guards and has first choice each year in the selection of recruits throughout the whole empire. The emperor is titular colonel of the regiment and almost invariably wears its uniform on state occasions.

The demands of the men show clearly by their adoption of the motto, "one for all, all for one," that the movement was engineered by revolutionists. The words always form the concluding phrase of the proclamations and literature of the organization of the social revolutionists.
