LEWIS EIGHMEY'S EARLY HISTORY

Interesting Career of Sayre's Well Known and Highly Respected Citizen

Since the commencement of the lunacy proceedings in the case of Lewis Eighmey, Sayre's well known and respected citizen, there has been much discussion of the question and the public has evinced considerable interest. The older people in Sayre are well acquainted with Mr. Eighmey's early history, but the younger generation is not so well informed, and therefore The Record prints the following from the "History of Bradford County," published some twenty years ago:

"Lewis Eighmey, proprietor of the opera house, Sayre, is a native of Dorhan, N. Y., Green county, was born April 17, 1833. His parents were John and Henrietta Woodward Eighmey, natives of New York state. His father was a farmer and died in 1885 in his 77th year. His mother died in 1882 in her 73d year. Lewis, the second of a family of six sons and five daughters, received a fair public school education and commenced life on his own account in the timber business and ran a sawmill. He followed this business the greater part of the time until 1884, when he removed from his native place to Athens township in February, 1849. In 1861 he went to Troy, this county, and in October of that year he enlisted in the 7th cavalry, and was in the command of Generals Buel, Rosencrans and Sherman, and was taken prisoner August 2, 1862, at Galveston, Tenn., by General Monroe. He was paroled and sent to Annapolis, Md., and returned to his command March 1, 1863. When his term of service expired he reenlisted and served until the close of the war. He was mustered out of the service at Macon, Ga., August 25, 1865. He returned to Athens and remained there about a year, and then went to Pine Creek township, Tioga county, where he spent two years. From this place he went to Warren, then to Pittsfield, and remained there until 1883. Then he went to Bradford and during the time he was there drilled oil wells, remaining until 1882, when he removed to Sayre and commenced building the opera house, which was finished in 1884. The building is 80x51, three stories high, first floor stores, second dwellings, and the third an opera hall 80x51, stage 51x24, 455 opera chairs."

"Previous to the war he was married in Athens township to Susan, daughter of John and Katy Decker Westfall, natives of New Jersey; she is the fourth of a family of seven children, and was born in Sussex county, March 10, 1844. To them was born a daughter, Linnia. He is a member of Malloy Post, G. A. R., No. 285, Union Veteran Legion No. 28, Athens; Union Veteran's Union No. 18, Sayre, and a member of the school board of Sayre. Mr. Eighmey has always been a staunch Republican."

LEHIGH VALLEY PREFERRED STOCK

Supreme Court Hands Down Decision in Important Case

Yesterday the State Supreme Court of Pennsylvania handed down an opinion in which it is held that the preferred stockholders of the Lehigh Valley railroad company are entitled to cumulative dividends on their holdings from 1903. The opinion affirms a decision of a Philadelphia court which enjoined the railroad from making any dividends to the holders of common stock until it shall have paid its preferred stock dividends at the rate of ten per cent. per annum from October 17 1893. More than \$91,000 was involved in the litigation. Under this decision the holders of Lehigh Valley preferred shares will receive the full 100 per cent, or \$50 a share in back dividends.

The preferred capital aggregates 106,300 shares and seldom figures in the open market. It is held by a limited number of investors.

PATRONIZE HOME TRADE

A few days ago we printed an article at the request of the Business Men's Association relative to patronizing the home merchant. In connection therewith we beg to remind those who are interested that the home printer should be looked upon the same as the merchant, when it comes to patronizing home industries. At the present time the country is overrun with canvassers from outside towns, who solicit printing orders from Sayre merchants, usually at a figure which defies competition. Remember, however, that these fellows do not patronize the home merchant to the extent of a single cent. They merely take their order, print the same, send in the bill, collect the same, and that finishes the job.

ADJOURNMENT TAKEN

The commission appointed to inquire into the sanity of Lewis Eighmey met yesterday afternoon to listen to arguments of counsel on both sides, but by agreement adjournment was taken until July 9, at which time it is expected that final disposition will be made of the matter. The question has been before the people for some time. Five sessions of the commission have been held, twenty-five or more witnesses have been examined, involving an immense amount of work and patience.

The company carries fifteen tent shows, besides a large number of free features. Two merry-go rounds will be in operation, a Ferris wheel, and no end of smaller attractions. A liberal percentage of the receipts will be turned over to the local fire department to pay the expenses of the annual parade which is to be held in Sayre this year.

A "Queen" contest will also be one of the features. Ballot boxes will be distributed in various parts of the town, and voters will be permitted to name the most popular young lady in the town. One cent must accompany each vote, or it will not be counted. The fortunate young woman will receive a handsome diamond ring, furnished by Ike Samuels, the Lockhart street jeweler.

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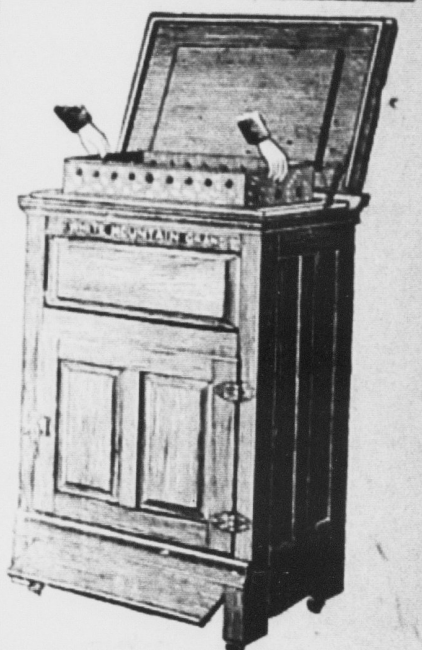
