### Request to Assign Gas Franchise Turned Down by the Council

The acetylene gas franchise came up before the council last night in the shape of a request on the part of one of the stockholders in the company asking permission to assign the franchise to other parties. When the franchise was granted the council insisted that a certified check for \$300 be put up by the promoter and also that he pay for advertising the ordinance. The promoter has failed to put up the check and also to pay for the publication of the ordinances. The time limit on the check expires on July 5, and if the check is not forthcoming the franchise will be void. The request to assign to other parties was referred to the borough council, which means that it is quite likely to be turned down.

## VILLAGE TRUSTEES' STORMY SESSION

There Were Many Important Questions For the Daddys to Consider Last Night

Waverly—The Waverly board of trustees held a long session last evening, which commenced at 7:30 o'clock and adjourned at 12:30. After much discussion, which at times was inclined to be stormy, the following budget was adopted for the coming year:

Electric lights \$3,600, hydrants \$2,500, police \$2,220, fire department \$1,500, police justice \$500, clerk's salary \$200, assessor's salary \$250, printing and stationery \$250, board of health \$350, fuel and care of public buildings \$500, interest on bonds \$1,577.02, bonds due \$2,500, sidewalk rebates \$3,500, Robert Packer hospital \$300, streets \$4,500, general \$3,500. Total, \$27,747.92. This will make the tax rate .0146 against 0551 last year.

Attorney Hawkes presented a petition from the Waverly, Sayre and Athens traction company, asking for a franchise to extend their tracks west on Broad street from Chemung street to the Erie tracks. On motion of Mr. Howard they will be given a hearing July 6, at 7:30 p. m. at the village hall.

A petition from Fulton street taxpayers asking for a concrete gutter from Elizabeth street to Chemung street was granted, to be paid for by the property owners in proportion to their frontages.

Mr. Stamford informed the board that the new fire alarm system was ready for inspection.

Ray Brooks was employed as paving inspector at a salary of \$2.50 per day.

W. C. Woodward was appointed pound master, and the ordinance requiring dogs to be tagged and muzzled, will be enforced.

The question of acquiring a new street connecting Ithaca street and Chemung street through the property of Emma Laine, created a hot time. The discussion waxed hot, and when President Lawrence called for a vote, Mr. Farley, who had presented the proposition, withdrew his motion with the consent of Mr. Myers, his second. The chair declared this out of order and put the vote under protest from Mr. Farley. Trustees Lang, Howard, Brown and Brougham voted no, and Trustees Myers and Farley refused to vote, claiming there was no motion before the board.

A motion by Mr. Farley, stating that it was the sense of the board that the Lehigh Valley company should build a new depot at East Waverly, was carried. Mr. Lang followed this with a motion that the street and sidewalk committee put the street in that vicinity in a condition in keeping with the improvement suggested in above motion.

Bills were paid amounting to nearly \$4,000, and the board adjourned till next Monday evening.

### WAS A CLEAN JOB

The council made a clean job of the sewer matter, once the project was in shape for disposal. The resolution for a trunk line sewer on certain streets, was passed with but little discussion, and a resolution making provisions for bonding the borough was quickly adopted. As soon as the bonds are printed and sold there will be nothing to interfere with the work of construction. The chances for an early start at the present time appear excellent.

The funeral of Mrs. Elizabeth Snell was held this afternoon at 3 o'clock from her late home, burial at Tioga Point cemetery.

### ORDINANCE NO. 23.

Authorizing a contract to be entered into on the part of the Borough of South Waverly, County of Bradford and State of Pennsylvania, with the Waverly Electric Light and Power Company of the Village of Waverly, County of Tioga and State of New York, and authorizing and empowering the Burgess to sign the necessary contract on the part of the Borough of South Waverly.

Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of South Waverly, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same:

Section 1. That the Borough of South Waverly enter into a contract with the Waverly Electric Light and Power Company for and during the term of five years from the first day of April, 1906, for 6 Amp. or 1200 nominal candle power arc lamps, at the price of \$55 per annum. Said lights to be kept lighted every night until one o'clock a. m., and 32 incandescent lamps to be lighted every night until one o'clock a. m., at \$20 per annum for each and every light.

Section 2. The Burgess of the Borough of South Waverly is hereby authorized and empowered to sign the necessary contract with the said Waverly Electric Light and Power Company for the period of five years, dating from April 1, 1906, as soon as this ordinance becomes effective.

The foregoing ordinance was duly passed at a regular meeting of the Borough Council of the Borough of South Waverly, Pa., June 5, 1906.

### Ordinance No. 94.

Authorizing the construction of a public sewer beginning at the west bank of the Susquehanna river about eight hundred feet south of Sayre Water Company's pumping station, and extending westerly over the lands of the Consolidated Real Estate Company and the lands of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company to Lehigh avenue; thence northerly on Lehigh avenue to Hayden street; thence westerly on Hayden street to the east side of Lehigh avenue on Desmond street; thence northerly on Desmond street to Lehigh avenue to Cayuga street; thence westerly on Cayuga street to Stevenson street, in the Borough of Sayre, Penna.

Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Sayre, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same: That believing it to be for the general health and public welfare of the citizens of said borough, that a system of public sewers be adopted and the same be hereby adopted for said borough. Beginning at a point at the west bank of the Susquehanna river about eight hundred feet south of the Sayre Water Company's pumping station and extending in a westerly direction over the lands of the Consolidated Real Estate Company and lands of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company to Lehigh avenue; thence northerly on Lehigh avenue to Hayden street; thence westerly on Hayden street to Desmond street; thence northerly on Desmond street to Lehigh avenue; thence northerly on Lehigh avenue to Cayuga street; thence westerly on Cayuga street to Stevenson street, all in the Borough of Sayre, State of Pennsylvania, in accordance with an Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, approved May 15th, 1889, entitled "An Act to enable Boroughs to construct sewerage systems, assess and collect the cost thereof," and the cost thereof be paid by general taxation, by an assessment levied upon all the property subject to taxation in said borough. Said sewer to be constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications made by Williams & Whitman, Inc., dated Sep. 1, 1905, and approved by the said Borough Council so far as it relates to a sanitary sewer only.

The foregoing Ordinance was unanimously adopted by the Sayre Borough Council at a meeting held Monday evening, July 2, 1906.

### Ordinance No. 95.

An ordinance authorizing the increase of the indebtedness of the Borough of Sayre, Pa., by the sum of twenty thousand dollars.

Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Sayre, Pa., and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same: That two hundred and fifty bonds of one hundred dollars each, bearing interest at the rate of four per cent per annum, interest payable bi-monthly, April 1st and October 1st, at the office of the treasurer of said borough and payable thirty years from date, with the right of said borough to redeem or pay any one or any number of them after five years be issued. That the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds be used for the purpose of redeeming or paying off five thousand dollars of the present indebtedness of said borough and so much of the balance as may be necessary, shall be used for the purpose of constructing the trunk line of a sewer for the sewer system of said borough. That a tax of one mill on the dollar of the adjusted valuation of said borough be levied each year for the payment of said indebtedness until same is paid.

The foregoing ordinance was unanimously adopted by the Sayre Borough Council at a meeting held Monday, July 2, 1906.

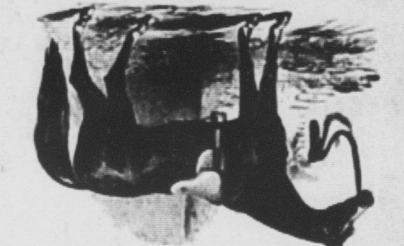
