

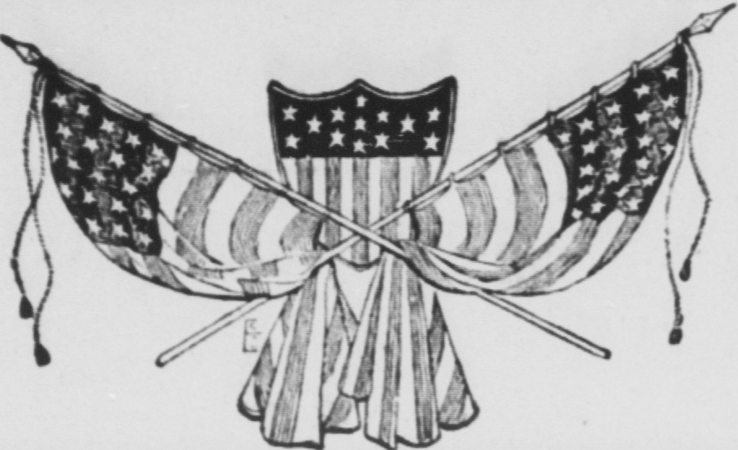

DOESN'T WANT TOGA

COBURN OF KANSAS DECLINES SENATORSHIP.

Well-Known Agriculturist Has Refused Other Offices That He Might Help Farmers — Ex-Judge Benson Succeeds Burton.

Topeka, Kan., July 2. F. D. Coburn, secretary of the state board of agriculture, who was tendered the appointment to succeed Joseph R. Burton in the United States senate, notified Gov. Hoch that he would not accept. The governor then offered the appointment to former Judge A. W. Benson of Ottawa, Kan., who accepted it.

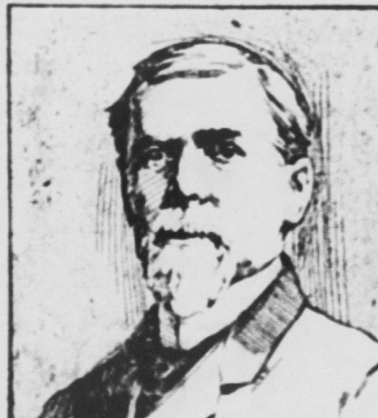
The offer of the senatorial toga to Secretary Coburn was peculiarly popular among the farmers. But had he accepted it they would have been disappointed, it is declared, for "Coburn of Kansas" was just the man for them, they said.

"Coburn of Kansas" might have been governor. But the agriculturists said they could not do without him as secretary of the state board of agriculture. So secretary he remained.

"Coburn of Kansas" might have gone to congress. But the stockmen cried that they could never raise their stock without his help. And he kept on being secretary.

The late President McKinley during his second term wanted "Coburn of Kansas" for secretary of the national department of agriculture. But what he did when the bugs come round demanded the orchardists. And so he continued working for the grangers of Kansas.

"Coburn of Kansas" stands up for his state, as Secretary Wilson learned in

1902, when the former, by the figures of the latter's own department, showed a statement credited to Secretary Wilson that "Kansas was in the semi-arid belt" was incorrect.

ATHENS BOROUGH COUNCIL MEETING

Athens — The regular monthly meeting of the borough council was held last evening. Burgess Kinney, President Weller, and Councilmen Tripp, Clark, Nevins, and Stevens being present.

After the routine business Mr. Francke of the board of health reported the work of that body for the month and gave an estimate of the amount of money necessary to meet their demands for the remainder of the term.

Mr. Tripp, chairman of the committee on No. 4 hose house stated that the architect had made plans and estimates for the proposed building and that it would cost about \$4,700. As there was no representative of that ward present no definite action could be taken, but it was decided that the price was more than could be entertained. On motion of Nevins it was decided that the building committee could go on and erect the building, but that the cost should be limited to \$28,000. The question as to the title of the lot having been raised, Mr. Mills, the borough attorney, stated that Mr. Button had presented satisfactory papers showing that the title would be secure, and that the money would be paid over and the deed secured in a day or two.

Councilman Stevens mentioned that the residents of Ann street were making complaints about the water standing in the streets. No action was taken.

Councilman Tripp mentioned the necessity for crosswalks across Second and Third streets, and the street commissioner was authorized to notify the property holders to build the walks.

On the Mrs. L. M. Parks property, South Main street, where the borough lowered the walks and cut down the lawns, it was requested that the stone steps be put in order.

The Spruce street conditions were discussed and it was proposed to cut through the concrete curbing at the McMorran lot so that the water might be carried through to the catch basins on Spruce street. The matter was referred to the street committee and borough engineer.

Chief Engineer Spaulding of the fire department appeared before the council and stated that there should be more efficient fire alarm established, as in the present case the firemen in the third and fourth wards can be reached only with great difficulty. It was suggested that some arrangement might be made whereby the alarm would be sounded by the watchmen at the bridge works and furniture factory. The matter was referred to the fire and safety committee.
