## BOROUGH SCHOOL DIRECTORS MEETING

Aside From Paying a Large Number of Bills But Little Business Was Transacted

The regular monthly meeting of the Sayre borough school directors was held on Tuesday evening. Directors Thompson, Whittle, Maddock, Balt, Biltz, Shedden, Cook and Hutchinson being present.

The board was in session about three hours and a half, the greater part of the time being occupied in reading the minutes of preceding meetings and discussing the parliamentary practice with reference to filling the vacancy caused by the resignation of Cathryn Storms, a teacher in the second grade of the Fourth ward school. Miss Storms was married recently, and last night her resignation was read and accepted. Several teachers had asked to be transferred to the position which Miss Storms occupied, among them being Miss Strauss and Miss Dobell. The question was finally settled by Miss Strauss being elected to the position formerly held by Miss Storms and Miss Dobell was elected to the vacancy caused by the advancement of Miss Strauss.

The committee appointed to visit the various school buildings to ascertain what repairs were necessary, reported that the buildings were in good shape and that but few repairs were needed.

The tax collectors and the auditors reports were read and ordered entered on the minutes.

A large number of bills, including those for coal for the past year, were ordered paid.

An order for \$500 was ordered drawn to pay a bond which is due at the National bank of Sayre.

The salary of D. S. Pennell, janitor at the Fourth ward school building, was raised from \$38 to \$39 per month.

The board will arrange to make a loan of about \$6,000 to pay the outstanding indebtedness.

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## PECULIAR OBJECT WAS A TORPEDO

And When it Exploded Four Men Were Nursing Wounds.

Shortly afternoon yesterday James T. Cornish, a tinsmith, who resides at No. 610 Lincoln street, found two peculiar looking packages. The packages were alike in every respect, and as a fuse was sticking out of the end of each, he decided that they had been manufactured for Fourth of July purposes. He took them to the corner of Lincoln street and Keystone avenue, and showed his find to John Holcomb, Dade Edmunds, Grube Cornish and Dick Myers. These gentlemen also agreed that the packages were intended to "go off" and one of them lit a match. As he applied it to the fuse the others in the party gathered close about. The instant that the match touched the fuse there was a terrific explosion which is said to have shaken the foundations of the buildings in that vicinity. When the smoke had cleared away it was discovered that a big hole had been torn in Mr. Holcomb's coat and a piece of flesh on the muscle of the arm was also missing. Edmunds was nursing a wound in the right leg, while Myers was minus the end of one of his fingers. Grube Cornish got a puncture of the neck, but the man who found the infernal machine escaped unscathed. While the injuries sustained by the men are not of a serious nature they say the next time they will send all suspicious objects of that kind to an expert.

## FREIGHT HANDLERS STRIKE NEARING END

Many of the Men Have Returned to Work, While Others the Company Refuse to Take Back

The strike inaugurated Monday by the freight handlers on the local transfer freight platform is nearly at end. Many of the men who went out have returned to work, and it is expected that four or five will go to work today. There are, however, three or four of the men whom the company will refuse to take back. The local officials say that the service has been somewhat crippled by the action of the men but that now everything is running along in good shape and the freight is being properly handled. They also say that they have from time to time taken the matter of an increase for the men before high heads in the freight department, and had the men waited awhile an increase would probably have been granted. They insist that they are doing all in their power for the men, as they believe they should have more money. The men admit that the local officials have acted fair in the matter and that they fully appreciate the efforts that have been made for them.

## ATTENDED FAMILY REUNION

D. J. Sisson, the police officer in the Milltown district and his wife, went to Eldredge Park yesterday to attend the annual reunion of the Sisson family which for many years has held at that beautiful spot. There were forty-two present and they spent a most delightful day. Mrs. D. J. Sisson was elected president and Miss Rosamond Petty, of Daggetts, secretary-treasurer.

## FREIGHT CARS BURNED

Two freight cars standing in the upper Lehigh yards burned Tuesday afternoon between 4 and 5 o'clock. Two alarms of fire called out a big crowd, but when it was ascertained that the conflagration was confined to ordinary freight cars the faces of many were disappointed.

## SOUTH WAVERLY BOROUGH COUNCIL

Held An Important Meeting On Tuesday Evening and Transacted Considerable Business

The July meeting of the South Waverly borough council was held in the borough building Tuesday evening with the following members present: Burgess Conley, President Quick, Councilmen McCraney, Simmsabaugh and Gates, and Clerk Walsh.

After minutes of previous meeting had been read and approved, H. F. Maynard, Esq., appeared in behalf of the heirs of James E. Morris and asked the council to set a date for a conference. On the night of June 9 Mr. Morris fell through the Elmira street bridge over the Lackawanna tracks and sustained injuries from which he died in a few minutes. His heirs now propose to bring a damage suit against South Waverly borough, unless an amicable settlement be made. A committee consisting of Councilmen Stephens, Simmsabaugh and Borough Attorney Yocum was named to confer with Attorney Maynard.

The street committee was authorized to see N. F. Walker and bring about an adjustment of the street and sidewalk lines on Bradford street.

Borough bills amounting to \$191.75 were ordered paid.

R. A. Mercur, Esq., of Towanda, representing the N. Y. and Pa. Telephone and Telegraph Company, presented a request for a franchise that will allow the petitioners to place its wires under ground. A similar request was made at the meeting of the Sayre council the night before, and it was suggested that representatives of the South Waverly council meet with a committee from the Sayre council and agree on franchises that would contain uniform provisions. Councilmen Simmsabaugh, McCraney and Gates were appointed a committee to take charge of the matter so far as the interests of South Waverly are concerned.

President Quick stated that the chief of police had been paying for equipment such as handcuffs, nippers, etc., out of his private purse, and suggested that the borough reimburse him. A motion to that effect was accordingly passed, and in addition Chief Regan was authorized to buy a new dark lantern.

The police report for June showed two arrests and the imposition and collection of \$11 in fines and costs. There had been some discussion at previous meetings regarding the disposition of fines collected by the police magistrate and at this juncture of the proceedings Squire Edminster was sent for to enlighten the council. Squire Edminster stated that he had in his hands at the present time \$12 in fines which belonged to the borough. He had heretofore paid the moneys to the borough treasurer but will henceforth turn in these funds to the clerk of the council.

A resolution was passed instructing Clerk Walsh to notify Superintendent Case of the trolley company to place gates at the Elmira street bridge over the Lackawanna tracks within 24 hours, or the bridge would be closed by the borough.

A number of requests for rebates on sidewalks were referred to the street committee. The opinion was expressed by several councilmen that the borough would become bankrupt if the payment of sidewalk rebates were to continue without let or hindrance. Since some of the members were unable to attend Wednesday night's meeting, it was the consensus of opinion that the rebate question should be brought up when all the councilmen were present.

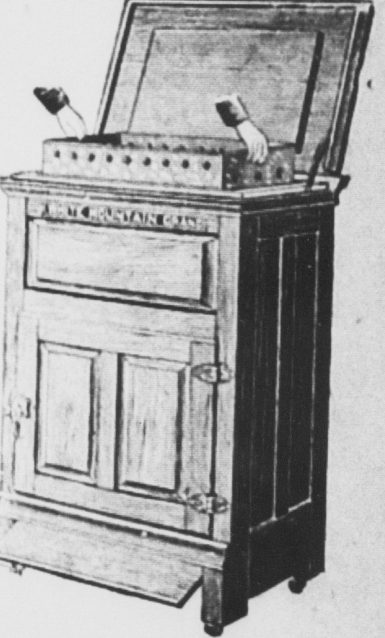
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
