STARTLING CANARD QUICKLY EXPLODED

Report that Abutment to New Bridge is in a State of Collapse Utterly Without Foundation.

A wild and unauthenticated rumor, utterly without foundation, was circulated about the streets this morning to the effect that the east abutment of the new bridge which crosses the Susquehanna river at this place was gradually giving way and that in a short time it would cause the structure to "buckle." The rumor was given considerable coloring from the fact that the county commissioners came to Sayre this morning. It was stated that they had examined the bridge and expected an engineer from Towanda here at noon time to go to the bridge and make provisions for a new abutment.

A Record representative was told the story and then he got busy. Commissioners Harkness, Marsh and McNulty were seen, but when they had listened to the story pronounced it absolutely without foundation.

As a matter of fact the officials had come to Sayre this morning for the purpose of going to Tezer's bridge which crosses the Chemung just east of town. It is said that this structure is in need of slight repairs and the matter had been called to the attention of the county commissioners. Just what the repairs are the commissioners did not state.

The commissioners, however, stated that the Sayre bridge is one of the best jobs in the county, and that it is as solid as it was two years ago when it was opened to the public.

THIEVES ROBBED REFRIGERATOR

Domestic Cold Storage Plant Relieved of a Large Quantity of Vegetables and Provisions

A refrigerator standing on the rear porch of No. 414 Desmond street, was broken open and robbed by sneak thieves last night. Mrs. Jackson, who recently moved here from Ithaca, occupies the house and keeps boarders. The refrigerator was well supplied with provisions, including pork steak, veal cutlets, fish, potatoes, potato salad, bread, cheese, cake, lemons and a quantity of fresh garden vegetables. These were all taken by the thieves. In fact the refrigerator was divested of its entire contents. The robbery was committed during the night while the inmates of the house were asleep. The perpetrators are believed to be a gang of tramps that have been camping near the Susquehanna river for several days. Chief Walsh was notified of the robbery and is conducting an investigation. This is the second refrigerator to be robbed in Sayre within a fortnight.

BENNETT CHARGED WITH DESERTION

Committed to County Bastille Yesterday in Default of Bail

In default of bail C. W. Bennett, who has been employed in the Lehigh Valley shops, was committed to the county jail yesterday afternoon and was taken to that institution on the evening train. Bennett was charged with deserting his wife and family, the complaint being made by Mrs. Bennett before Justice Nelson. According to the story told by Mrs. Bennett her husband had drawn his pay from the Lehigh and purchased a ticket for Minneapolis. Before he could get away, however, she caused a warrant to be issued for his arrest and he was taken in custody. When arraigned he pleaded guilty, but would make no effort to get bail and was therefore committed to jail. The case will come up before the grand jury.
