DISPUTE OVER LOCATION OF FAIR

Strong Effort Made to Have the Exhibition Given on Elmer Avenue

For a time this morning, there was considerable excitement over a contention as to where the street fair should be located. This is the third year that a Carnival Co. has exhibited in Sayre. The first exhibition was located on the vacant lot on lower Desmond street. The second exhibition was also given on this lot, and both exhibitions attracted large crowds. Business interests on that street were there fore greatly benefited, and when it was announced that the American Amusement Company, under the auspices of the local fire department, was to exhibit on the same grounds again this year, an effort was made by certain business interests in the other end of the town to locate the show on one of the main streets of the town. Accordingly a license was secured from Burgess Cross to permit the show to be given on Elmer avenue between Lockhart street and Packer avenue. When the burgess granted the license he understood that the property owners, in front of whose residences the exhibition was to be given, had granted their consent, but this morning it developed that some of them were opposed to the plan. The property owners who objected insisted that the show would be of great inconvenience to them and that they would suffer damages to a considerable extent. When their attention was called to the license granted by the burgess they declared that they would begin injunction proceedings. Lawyers were consulted, but before the matter had gone far, the committee representing the fire department concluded to abandon the Elmer avenue project and the outfit was set up on the Desmond street grounds.

The matter created considerable discussion. It is claimed by those who were desirous of having the show on Elmer avenue that in other cities it is customary to use the principal streets. Of course the street is closed so far as traffic is concerned, but it is claimed the benefit derived is sufficient to more than cover the damages and inconvenience. The crowds which have heretofore attended the street fairs in this place have been good spenders, and business places situated near the grounds have been big winners.

The difficulty this morning, however, was satisfactorily adjusted and the fair will be ready to exhibit this evening as if nothing had occurred.

CARRIAGE TIPPED OVER

Yesterday afternoon a carriage containing Station Agent Osborn of Athens, and two women, was overturned at the corner of South Elmer avenue and Packer avenue. The wheel caught between the main rail and the guard rail, and was wrenched completely from the wagon. The occupants of the wagon were thrown out but none of them were seriously injured. The wheel was smashed to pieces.

A BIG ATTRACTION

Phil Hamburg's "Disaster of San Francisco" is one of the big attractions at the street fair. Mr. Hamburg has been with Bostock, the animal showman, and also with other big attractions. He carries seventeen people and puts up a first class exhibition, one which men, women and children should all attend.

COMMISSION HELD SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING

Secretary Kalbfus Would Prohibit Foreigners Owning Guns or Other Firearms

The Pennsylvania State Game Commission held its semi-annual meeting in Harrisburg on Thursday, for the purpose of hearing the report of Secretary Kalbfus and the transaction of routine business.

A most encouraging condition of affairs regarding the increase of game in the state was presented by Secretary Kalbfus. He strongly recommended that a law be passed making it a penal offense for any unaturalized foreign born resident to own a gun or any kind of firearms. In the last six months five officers of the game commission in hunting down offenders against the game laws have been shot at and wounded. One man was brutally murdered by Italians in the western part of the state, and his body thrown into the river, simply because he prosecuted foreign violators of the game laws.

Dr. Kalbfus recommends that a law be passed requiring that all resident hunters take out a license.

During the half year there were \$1,800 in fines collected.

SECTION HAND INJURED

An Italian known as No. 1111 was brought here on Saturday night suffering from a bad contusion of the forehead which he received at Rummelfield while working in a Lehigh Valley section gang. He was assisting in carrying a tie when it slipped from his hands and one end of it struck him just above the left eye, inflicting an ugly looking wound. He was taken to the hospital for treatment. The injury is not a serious one.

PASSING RAPIDLY

How rapidly the seasons come and go. It seems like a few days only since we were rejoicing over the coming of spring with its robins and other song birds. Now preparations are being made for Labor day parades. The summer is passing rapidly and the first month of fall, Labor day and the opening of the public schools, all come too quickly for the busy man and woman.

TEACHERS IN DEMAND

There is a steady, insistent demand for school teachers all over the state. Perhaps never has the demand been greater than it is at the present time. The demand exceeds the supply. This indicates that either the wages are too low or that the general prosperous condition of the country has drawn young men and women into more active vocations.
