



LOCAL BREVITIES

The days are growing perceptibly shorter.

"The Midnight Call" is the attraction at the park tonight.

It is estimated that there were 2,000 people at the street carnival last night.

It is said that the pattern department of the Lehigh Valley shops at Drifton will be enlarged.

The Junior Philathea class of the Baptist church, taught by Clark A. Tuttle, is enjoying a picnic at Wildwood today.

The Socialist party of the Fourth ward will hold primaries on Friday evening at 8 o'clock in the Howard Elmer house rooms.

The Summer Stock Company, which opened the park here on May 28, will close its engagement one week from next Saturday night. It will be followed by the Bennett-Moulton company.

The street fair is drawing a big crowd and the management and the fire department will doubtless come out big winners.

The Delaware peach crop will be 200 per cent. larger than last year. This means that there will be an abundance of the delicious fruit.

A regular meeting of the West Sayre Chapter, No. 43, of O. E. S., will be held in Trainmen's hall on Friday evening, July 13, at 8 o'clock.

The Erie railroad company is erecting a new and modern station at New York city. It is constructed entirely of steel and will be a model structure.

The W. C. T. U. of Milltown will hold an evangelistic meeting at Milltown chapel tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock. All are invited to come and bring their bibles.

An old man, who claimed to be a veteran of '61 and '62, was gathered in by the police yesterday afternoon on a charge of drunkenness. He was allowed his liberty later.

The state highway department is now advertising for bids for the construction of almost three miles of road in Wells township, this county, which when built will be the first state road in the county. The construction is to be of macadam or telford.

A judge of the court of common pleas at Allentown has held that a mother has a perfect right to spank her grown up daughter, the latter not being of legal age. We have always been led to believe that there never was any dispute over this question.

The change made in the law last year relating to the open season for woodcock has been lost sight of by many sportsmen, who seem to be under the impression that woodcock may be taken during the present month. Woodcock may be killed only from October 1 to December 1.

The united lodges of the Modern Protective Association of Waverly, Sayre and Athens, will enjoy an excursion to Binghamton and the White City on Saturday, August 18. A special train will be run over the Erie, and the fare for the round trip will be only 75 cents, children 40 cents. The train will leave Waverly at nine o'clock, returning leave Binghamton at 9:30 p. m.

HENRY M. PEPPARD DIED LAST NIGHT

He Had Been in a Helpless Condition for Many Months

Henry Merritt Peppard, aged 56 years, died at his home, No. 404 Maple street, last night at nine o'clock, after a lingering illness. For several months he had been confined to his home in a helpless condition. Death was due to paralysis.

The deceased was a native of the town of Chemung, Chemung county, N. Y., and until a few years ago he conducted a farm near the village of Chemung. He came to Sayre and went to work in the shops until ill health forced him to quit.

He was a most highly respected citizen and gained a host of friends in this place. He is survived by his wife and one son, Charles M. Peppard, of Sayre. He is also survived by four brothers, Lewis, Isaac, George and Tell, all of Chemung.

Short prayer service will be held from his late home tomorrow morning after which the remains will be taken to Chemung for burial.

CONTRACTS EXECUTED

The contracts between the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company and Bradford county, and the railroad company and Wysox township, made nearly a month ago and signed by the commissioners of the county and the township, have been executed by the officers of the railroad company. The contract with the commissioners of Bradford county provides for the payment of \$20,000 to the county by the railroad company, provided the proposed James street bridge across the Susquehanna river is completed within five years. Of this sum \$1,500 is to be paid for the privilege of crossing the causeway approach to the covered bridge at Towanda with an overhead structure and lowering the highway to give at least 13 feet in the clear. The contract with the Wysox township commissioners disposes of the changes in the highway east of the river.

THEY YELLED "FIGHT"

Two young men who were of the opinion that things were running somewhat slow at the street fair last night, yelled "fight," and then scampered away. A crowd collected only to find that there was no fight. The young men repeated the performance and then the police put a stop to it by taking the boys in custody. After giving them a lecture the police gave the young men their liberty.

BIG CROWD LAST NIGHT

The street carnival drew another big crowd last night. It is doubtful if a larger audience ever assembled in Sayre on a similar occasion. At 8:30 o'clock the grounds were packed with humanity, and at 9 o'clock standing room in the open space in front of the various attractions was at a premium. The shows all did a rushing business. Tonight another big crowd is anticipated.

MUST NOT TALK

Notices have been posted in the Lehigh Valley shops at Weatherly to the effect that in the future there must be no talking among the employes during working hours. Failure to obey this order will mean discharge. The employes do not take kindly to the new order as they say they have not abused the privilege in the past.

TROLLEY INTERESTS

CONSOLIDATING

Pulling Together in Order to Prevent an Invasion of Their Territory

The Corning Journal has the following to say concerning the prospects for a trolley line connecting Corning and Binghamton:

"Binghamton, Waverly, Elmira and Corning interests have already in operation trolley lines furnishing first class local service in the places named and reaching out toward each other. The closing of the gaps would create a continuous trolley line from Corning to Binghamton. The right to do this has already been granted by the Railroad Commission of the state of New York. The several companies composing this chain of trolley links have entered into a working agreement that amounts to a practical consolidation. They are pulling together to prevent an invasion of their territory that would amount to disastrous competition; or, that which is nearly as bad, a "hold up," or buy out on the part of the exploiters who make that kind of promoting a business.
