Fitzgerald helped her out, and she was clad in overcoats and shawls until she could get to a place where she could procure dry clothing. The picnic was a great success, this being the only mishap.

A MILLINER MURDERED.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 12.—Employees of the National hotel found the body of Miss Nellie Ellison, a milliner of Ellsworth, Wis., nearly burned to a crisp in her room. Her head had been crushed by the blow of a hammer, and her body had been tied to a couch saturated with wood alcohol. This had then been set on fire.
The police suspect a man from Milwaukee of having been implicated in the murder, and a search is now being made for him. They believe the woman was attacked in her sleep.
Robbery was the motive for the murder. Miss Ellison had lately sold out her millinery business at Ellsworth, Wis., and had come to the Twin Cities with about \$5,000. No such sum was found in her room at the hotel. M. J. Wilson, who had the room directly above, took two satchels away with him. Investigation at Ellsworth shows that Miss Ellison had always borne a good reputation. Her parents have arrived here.

Camp Opens at Niantic, Conn.

CAMP COLE, Niantic, Conn., July 13.—With all the commands of the First brigade, Connecticut national guard, which have been ordered here, under canvas the brigade camp is in full swing. After the strenuous work of a sham fight in the valley from Gortons Mills to the Boston schoolhouse road the men were quite willing to sleep in their hot tents.

Yacht Mopas Wins Long Race.

NEW YORK, July 13.—The sloop yacht Mopas of the Harlem Yacht club was last night declared the winner of the 400 mile ocean race from New Rochelle around Montauk to Northeast End Lightship, off Cape May, N. J., and return to New York, for the challenge cup offered by the Brooklyn Yacht club. The Mopas crossed the finish line at Gravesend bay at 7:22:40 last night, making her elapsed time over the course 105 hours 22 minutes 40 seconds, she having started from New Rochelle at 10 o'clock on the morning of July 7.

Drake's Colors in Front Four Times.

SALEM, N. H., July 12.—John A. Drake's colors were in front in four of the six races here. Drake won with Robo, Runnels, Wes and Ireland. Runnels made his first appearance in a race in nearly a year and won with ease in the second event. He was turned out last fall, and it was expected that he would never race again. Jockey Garner rode all four of Drake's horses. The last race of the day was the best, Jim Leonard beating Tanager, the favorite, by a head in the last jump.

Travel Played Great Golf.

ENGLEWOOD, N. J., July 12.—The Englewood Golf club's course was the scene of some brilliant work when Walter J. Travis of Garden City, a double winner of the national honor and also a winner of the British amateur championship title, was the star of the play, coming in with a 75, which made his total for the thirty-two holes 152, this score earning for him the medal play trophy. His closest rival was Jerome D. Travers, with a total of 150.

LOOK FOR WAR NOW.

Invader and Guatemala Open Hostilities on Frontier.
WASHINGTON, July 12.—Hostilities between Salvador and Guatemala have broken out anew on the border between these countries where peace was supposed to have been established pending a settlement of the trouble between the two countries.
Leslie M. Combs, the American minister to Guatemala, who was on his way to the United States to assist in settling the difficulties between Salvador and Guatemala has been ordered back to Guatemala City from Champerico, Guatemala, where he was reached by cable.
Mr. Combs will remain in the Guatemalan capital to keep the United States advised concerning the trouble and to protect American interests. Salvador and Guatemalan troops have been massed near the common boundary of the two countries for some time and a serious clash was expected, but a temporary armistice seemed to have been agreed upon and Salvador announced that J. R. Pacus had been named as a special envoy to Washington for the purpose of making representations to the American government concerning Salvador's position. John Jenkins, the American consul general at Salvador, was to accompany Mr. Pacus to this country.
Salvador's alleged assistance of revolutionists in Guatemala who were attempting to overthrow President Cabrera caused Guatemala to protest bitterly to the United States and Mexico and resulted in representations to Salvador by those two republics which indicated that they resented foreign interference in the internal affairs of Guatemala.

Ordinance No. 94.
Authorizing the construction of a public sewer beginning at the west bank of the Susquehanna river about eight hundred feet south of Sayre Water Company's pumping station, and extending westerly over the lands of the Consolidated Real Estate Company and the lands of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company to Lehigh avenue; thence northerly on Lehigh avenue to Hayden street; thence westerly on Hayden street to Desmond street; thence northerly on Desmond street to Lehigh avenue; thence northwesterly on Lehigh avenue to Cayuga street; thence westerly on Cayuga street to Stevenson street, in the Borough of Sayre, Penna.
Be it ordained by the Burgesses and Town Council of the Borough of Sayre, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same: That believing it to be for the general health and public welfare of the citizens of said borough, that a system of public sewers be adopted and the same is hereby adopted for said borough. Beginning at a point at the west bank of the Susquehanna river about eight hundred feet south of the Sayre Water Company's pumping station and extending in a westerly direction over the lands of the Consolidated Real Estate Company and lands of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company to Lehigh avenue; thence northwesterly on Lehigh avenue to Hayden street; thence westerly on Hayden street to Desmond street; thence northerly on Desmond street to Lehigh avenue; thence northwesterly on Lehigh avenue to Cayuga street; thence westerly on Cayuga street to Stevenson street, in the Borough of Sayre, State of Pennsylvania, in accordance with an Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, approved May 15th, 1889, entitled "An Act to enable Boroughs to construct sewerage systems, assess and collect the cost thereof; and the cost thereof be paid by general taxation, by an assessment levied upon all the property subject to taxation in said borough. Said sewer to be constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications by Williams & Whitman, Inc. dated Sep. 1, 1905, and approved by the said Borough Council so far as it relates to a sanitary sewer only.
The foregoing Ordinance was unanimously adopted by the Sayre Borough Council at a meeting held Monday evening, July 2, 1906.

Ordinance No. 95.

An ordinance authorizing the increase of the indebtedness of the Borough of Sayre, Pa., by the sum of twenty thousand dollars.
Be it ordained by the Burgesses and Town Council of the Borough of Sayre, Pa., and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same: That two hundred and fifty bonds of one hundred dollars each, bearing interest at the rate of four per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, April 1st and October 1st, at the office of the treasurer of said borough and payable thirty years from date, with the right of said borough to redeem or pay any one or any number of them after five years be issued. That the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds be used for the purpose of redeeming or paying off five thousand dollars of the present indebtedness of said borough and so much of the balance as may be necessary, shall be used for the purpose of constructing the trunk line of a sewer for the sewer system of said borough. That a tax of one mill on the dollar of the adjusted valuation of said borough be levied each year for the payment of said indebtedness until same is paid.
The foregoing ordinance was unanimously adopted by the Sayre Borough Council at a meeting held Monday, July 2, 1906.
