MANY ERRORS IN GREENSBORD SPEECH

at Propognition of Trusts Not Re plt of New Laws-Old Statutes amply Sufficient if They Mad Been Enforced.

NEW YORK, July 12.-Former Judge B Parker in a statement made takes issue with some of the ces of Secretary of War Taft speech delivered at Greensboro.

N. C., by Mr. Taft last Monday. Judge Parker declares that the secre tary in his speech sought to have the lie draw the inference that the recent prosecution of alleged lilegal comus are due to new statutes. To this Judge Parker takes exception, and to support his contention he quotes from his letter of acceptance and a speech subsequently delivered during the last presidential campaign. In both the speech and the letter Judge Parker oted as saying that the laws then on the statute book were entirely adequate if enforced.

Judge Parker in his statement says:
"The inference that Secretary Taft would have the public draw from his utterances is that these things are due to new statutes, that the vindication which the law is now receiving is due to congressional action since 1904. But

'Not one of the successful prosecuins for which the existing adminisation is now entitled to credit is ed on any new statute. Every sine one of them down to this date rests ty upon the law as it stood in 1904. and it should not be lost sight of by a discriminating public that the law could have been enforced in 1904 and in 1903 and in 1902 just as well as today. Had it been the wrongs from which the people have suffered would not have so multiplied.

ecrotary Taft's speech," says Judge Parker's statement, "was interesting ughout, but it cannot be said that it was accurate throughout. I shall ly refer to the statement in which be ed to the position taken by me in the campaign of 1904, in substance and effect that we have law enough to stop every corporate abuse, that all that is lacking is an administration disposed to enforce the law.

"I said in the letter of acceptance un der the title of 'Trust Remedies.'

"I pointed out in my earlier re sponse the remedy which, in my judg-ment, can effectually be applied against ies, and the assurance was en given that if existing laws, inng both statute and common law. proved inadequate, contrary to my exectations, I favor such further legislaion with constitutional limitations, as will best promote and safeguard the interests of all the people."

"I emphasized the same thought on other occusious in public speech. I retterated it in a speech on Jefferson's day, 1905, in which I said:

The plain truth is that there has been no time during the past eight years, since the abuses alleged became lagrant, when they could not have inated. Nothing has been so much needed as a rigid, honest, un Cincinnati yielding enforcement of the law as it stood, both civil and criminal. But initead of going on with the enforcement of the law against rebates by putting the railroad officials responsible for them behind prison bars precisely as we do other malefactors their misconduct is made an excuse for further concentration of power in the federal gov-

The administration has now discovered not only that there is enforceable law against the giving of rebates and law adequate to check illegal combinations, but that the persons engaged in violation can be punished for it. The recent decisions of the courts, the large fines imposed in cases of conviction, the threatened proceedings in every section of the country, all demonate that the law is and long has been adequate to stop offcuses against
