SURVEYS COMPLETED

Surveys have been completed by a large party of Lehigh Valley engineers for the extension of the company's lines from Montrose, Pa., to Binghamton. The surveyors have been at work in the vicinity of Montrose since early in the summer, and for some time they have made their headquarters in Montrose. To routes from Montrose to Binghamton have been made, and the plans and blue prints are now in the hands of the officials.

Oldest Negro Lawyer.
