Remains of a Drunken Rev. ALLENTOWN, Pa., July 16.—During drunken revels among Slavonian laborers at Fogelsville at midnight an oil lamp was upset, setting fire to a boarding house. Eight frame houses were destroyed, and Stefan John Evonic, aged fifty-eight; his son, Michael Evonic, aged twenty-three, and Michael Tebut, aged thirty-three, were burned to death. The first named two were overcome in their beds. Tebut had fled, but rushed back to save his money and perished. Another man had his back broken in jumping from a second story window. The pecuniary loss is about \$4,000.

Fatal Bolt at Chicago. CHICAGO, July 16.—An unidentified boy was killed and four others were seriously burned by lightning while seeking shelter from a rainstorm under a tree on the Lake Shore drive. Several buildings in Chicago were struck by lightning and set on fire, the most seriously damaged being the residence of Archbishop James E. Quigley, which sustained a loss of \$10,000. The bolt of lightning is thought to have struck a cable of the telephone company, as nearly every telephone bell on the north exchange was rung.
