# TREACHERYCHARGED

President Cabrera Is Accused of Bad Faith.

AGREES TO ARMISTICE; LEADS ATTACK

Guatemalans Indignant Over Report From Salvador That They Continued Fighting After Signing a Truce.

SAN SALVADOR, July 19. - The armistice between Salvador and Hou-duras on one side and Guatemais on the other has been declared and a treaty of peace is to be discussed in neutral waters on board the United States cruiser Marblebead. On Tuesday the Guatemalan forces

were defeated at Platanar and Metapan with enormous losses. Notwithstanding President Cabrera's

agreement with the president of Mexico to cease fighting pending peace negotiations two sharp engagements have occurred in Salvador just across the Guatemsian border. One was at Plata-nar and the other at Metapan. On Tuesday within two hours after

Cabrers had agreed to suspend hostilfties his troops attacked the Salvadorean army at Platanar, only to be defeated by the latter. The fighting at Metapan occurred Monday afternoon. Both Platanar and Metapau are objective points in the march to Santa Ana, the ummer capital of Salvador.

The Guatemalans are much annoyed by reports from Salvadorean points that Guatemala continued fighting after it had agreed to cease hostilities.

"Such stories are absolutely without foundation," an official said. "There was no agreement to cease fighting un-til the armistice went into effect yesterday, and the enemies of the government are endeavoring to put it in a false light. Negotiations for an armistice have been confused with the actual agreement to stop war, and in justice to the government I hope it will be generally understood that any fighting done previous was not in violation of any oace compact."

Salvador and Guatemala will decide through their representatives to the peace conference on board the United States eruiser Marblehead whether Honduras is to be represented in the conference. There are only two sides to the controversy so far as the world of diplomacy knows, that of Guatemala and that of Salvador.

LONDON, July 19.—The committee of he bouse of lords on juvenile smoking has reported in favor of a penalty for selling eigerettes to a child under sixcen years of age, imposing a penalty on a child found in possession of cigarettes or smoking tobacco and authorizing the police, schoolmasters and park keepers to stop youths from smoking and to confiscate their tobacco.
