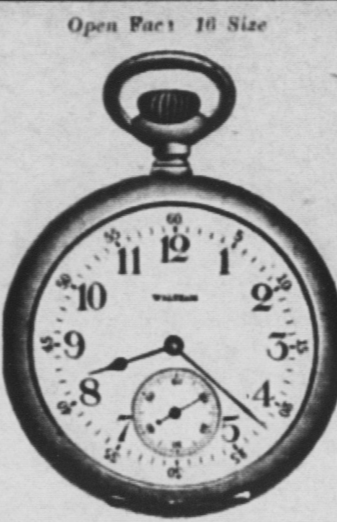

### HE INTERFERED

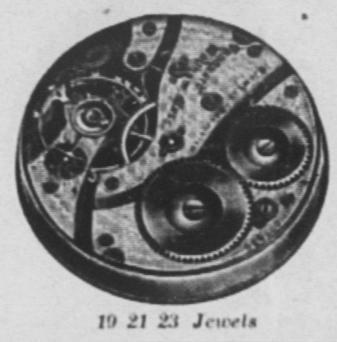
