A SOCIETY BALLOON TRIP.

Dr. and Mrs. Thomas Circle in Airship over New York.

NEW YORK, July 20.—Dressed as if for a garden party Mrs. Julia P. Thomas, the society ballooning lady, sailed away from the earth and the Bronx gas works in the Nirvana, her husband's big airship. Her companions were Dr. Thomas and Roy Knabenshue, their aeronaut. A big crowd cheered the departure.

They went up straight as a homing angel for 1,000 feet and then, urged on by a northeasterly wind, started diagonally across Manhattan, bound for an island in New Jersey.

Streams of moisture from the gas dripped down into the car, ruling Mrs. Thomas' big picture hat and her black silk auto coat. But she never minded that. She was waving adieu to those she left behind. Just as the start was made Dr. Thomas aimed a big living picture machine at the gawky rappy and turned it loose. It went out of sight, clicking like a dollar watch.

"We'll stay up all night if it is possible," said Dr. Thomas as the helpers began to cast off the shore lines, "but if we get in danger or become uncomfortable we will come down. This is merely a pleasure trip—merely that and nothing more."

To prove the truth of this he hefted up a big basket of lunch and a bunch of cold bottles so that all might see. There was tremendous applause.

Mrs. Thomas was perfectly cool when the time for going away from here arrived. She kissed her little son and shook hands with a few friends, smiling all the while.

The big, hollow checked bag of oiled silk rose like a bird under the direction of the experienced balloonist, Roy Knabenshue, the aeronaut, as chauffeur or driver or steersman or whatever it is proper to call a professional cloud pusher who goes along with amateurs.

This was the second time Dr. and Mrs. Thomas have sailed cloudland in an airship together. The first ascension was so successful that they had been looking forward to another excursion ever since. If only their seven-year-old son Odon had accompanied them it would have been a regular family party. Odon went with his parents to the gas works to witness the departure, but he—also, poor child—was forced to remain behind much against his will.

After sailing over the East river and heading for Coney Island the Nirvana was whirled back over New York. After hovering for two hours over the city, making a complete circle, it was calmed for a time over the northern end of Ward's island, which it had passed some time before.

It finally landed in New Jersey, close to the Hudson river and opposite the upper end of New York.

THE MORRIS DAMAGE CASE IS SETTLED

A Waverly Official Settled the Case Out of Court—Consideration is \$1,000

South Waverly—The claim of the heirs and next of kin against the borough of South Waverly for damages arising out of the death of James Morris, who was killed by falling over the abutment of the Elmira street bridge has been settled. The borough officials had been notified that an action for damages would be started, but one of the officers of the village of Waverly tendered his good offices and succeeded in settling the claim for \$1,000. The release that will be given when the money is paid releases the borough, the Lackawanna railroad and the W. S. & A. Traction Co. from any further liability in the matter.
