HISTORIC DOCUMENTS FOUND

The Troy Gazette last week mentioned the fact that there has been an interesting discovery of old letters of historic significance made in the home of Mrs. Charles C. Paine. In searching for some special documents requested by the Athens Historical society, letters were found from Dr. Samuel Adams, the well known patriot signer of the Declaration of Independence, to Thomas Paine, Esq., great grandfather of the present generation of Paines in that place, dated Dec. 6, 1774, concerning a rumor which prevailed that the "Standard of Liberty had been destroyed by the polluted hands of Tories," and mentioning that "the obnoxious tea is taken into custody and stored." Others of 1783 and 1790 were of interest in the mention of matters of state. Letters from William Paine, father of John Howard Paine, the author of "Home Sweet Home," to his kinsman were found dated 1776. The Paines, Clement and David, residing in Athens, were kinsmen of this notable family, and when the writer first came to Athens to reside the relationship between them and John Howard Paine was a matter of public note. David Paine's widow then resided in a house on the spot where the Maurice residence now stands, while the Clement Paine residence was near the J. White milk station.

ON CHARGE OF ASSAULT

Athens—Mrs. Emma Johnson had Lottie Heemans arrested for the assault on Susquehanna street Saturday afternoon, and the case was heard before Justice Tozer this forenoon.
