There was a large delegation at the station to receive the children as they were assigned to their respective places by Mrs. Farnsworth and it was a cheery sight to witness the glad hearted children who had the first opportunity of their lives to get the sunshine and fresh air of the country. Already they had come to love Mrs. Farnsworth for her kind attention to their wants as they made the long journey from Brooklyn, and when they landed from the cars they all clustered around her and showed their appreciation of her services. There are ten more to come today and they will be tagged and put into the care of the conductor of the train until they arrive at Athens. The good people of our town who have come forward and opened their homes to these children all deserve great praise but Mrs. Farnsworth more than all has worked hard and earnestly to perfect the arrangements for this enterprise.
