BURN PLAYMATE AT STAKE WHILE IMITATING INDIANS

Children The Little Girl to Fencepost, Light Fire Under Her, and She Is Fatally Injured.

Montgomery, W. Va.—The five-year-old child of Robert Maroney, of Cedar Grove, Kanawha county, was tied to a stake and burned to death by playmates, who were emulating the characters in a mock initiation of "Red Men," recently presented by members of a local lodge in the public hall at that place.

The children, the oldest of whom is about ten, were arrayed like Indians, and the little Maroney child,

who was the "pale face," was seized and bound to a fence post. A quantity of shavings were placed about its feet, saturated with oil, and lighted, the flames communicated with the child's clothing, and in a moment the little body was wreathed in flames.

The other children, realizing what they had done, struggled manfully to tear away the burning material and did rescue the child while still alive, but it succumbed almost immediately to its injuries.

MISS GODDELL'S BODY FOUND.

Father of Girl Missing Since July 6 Takes Her From Pond.
BELCHERTOWN, Mass., July 27.—The body of Miss Winona M. Goodell, who disappeared from her home on July 6 and for whom search has been made continuously since, has been found in a pond which had been dragged so many times fruitlessly.

A superficial examination of the body indicated that the girl was accidentally drowned, but it will remain for the inquest, which will be held today, to settle fully the question whether the young woman was the victim of an accident or of foul play.

The girl's father, Wesley M. Goodell, State Detective Hodges and other officers who have been investigating the mystery of the girl's disappearance believe that her death was purely accidental, and this opinion seems to be confirmed by the finding of a handkerchief tightly clutched in the dead girl's right hand.

Shortly after the report of the disappearance of Miss Goodell was first given out a railroad brakeman, William Bailey, said that on the afternoon of July 6, the day of the girl's departure from her home to go riding on the pond, his train passed the pond about 4:30, and he saw a girl standing in a boat and waving a handkerchief at the train. This circumstance, with the finding of the handkerchief in the dead girl's hand, is considered as clearly pointing to accidental drowning.

It is supposed that the girl fell over the side of the boat while standing and that the boat afterward righted itself, not having taken in water, and drifted to the point where it was found later.

Locusts in Algeria.
Locusts are devastating southern Algeria. The swarms are so great as almost to defy imagination. It is not easy to conceive of an almost solid phalanx of insects 125 miles long by six miles wide. Unfortunately, the devastation which such myriads of voracious insects must create in vegetation is not so difficult to appreciate. Wherever the host has passed nothing green remains. Even the houses are becoming uninhabitable. The Oran province seems doomed for this year.

Oyster Culture.
The Maryland shellfish commission is studying oyster culture in the proper way by learning in Connecticut just how the thing is done. Oyster culture has long been practiced in France and Japan, to say nothing of Virginia. Many years ago Dr. Brooks' book on the subject laid down the principles that underlie the successful prosecution of the industry.
