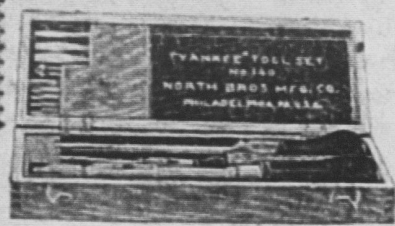

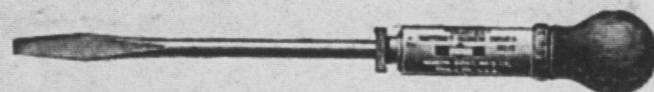

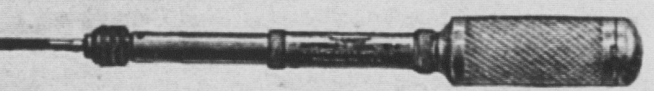

TRACTION COMPANY LAYING NEW RAILS

One Side of Track From Power House to Bridge Over Lehigh Put in Today

The work of taking out the old light forty pound rails and substituting the new ninety pound rails along the line of the local traction company is progressing very rapidly. The work was begun yesterday and today the rails on one side of the track from the power house to the bridge over the Lehigh are being put in place.

New ties were placed under the old rails some time ago and yesterday the heavy rails were strung along the track and bolted together in long sections. This morning the old rails were taken out and the new heavy rails substituted, causing very little delay in the traffic. This is an improvement that will be greatly appreciated by the public, as the heavy rail makes a smooth, even track, free from the kinks and hollows that easily get into the lighter rails. The South Waverly line is equipped with the heavy rails, and it is a pleasure to ride over that part of the line.

The company intends to lay the heavy rails over the entire system, and bring it up to the standard of that in South Waverly.

BIDDING ON TOWANDA STATION

Lehigh Valley's New Station at Towanda Will Be Near Old Site

John Berger of Corning, a contractor, has been in Towanda to look over the ground at the upper station preparatory to submitting a bid for the erection of the Lehigh Valley's new passenger station in Towanda, says The Review. Bids are to be in by Aug. 6. The specifications call for a building of Bradford brick, some 25-30 feet. It is estimated that the cost of the proposed structure will be in the neighborhood of \$12,000, possibly more.

The specifications furnished and the early date for the closing of bids indicate that the choice of a site for the passenger station in Towanda has been definitely made, and that all hope for the main station at East Towanda is gone. The Lehigh is under contract with the township of Wysox to build and maintain a station at East Towanda, near the present local station.

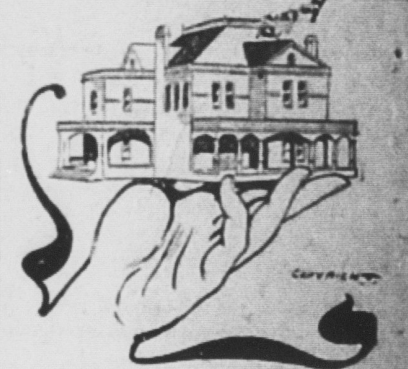
