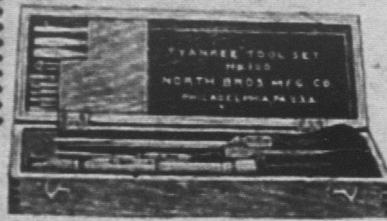

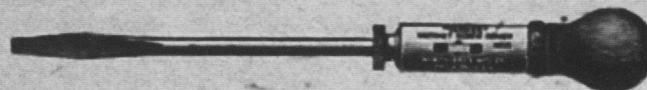

## FIRE DEPARTMENT TO HOLD MEETING

Department in Financial Straits  
--Will Decide on Method of Meeting the Difficulty

There will be a mass meeting of all the firemen at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at the rooms of the R. A. Packer hose company, over Kasper's restaurant on Desmond street. It is hoped that every fireman who is able will make it a point to be present, as many matters of vital interest to the fire department of Sayre will come up for decision.

The department has been laboring under difficulties, mostly financial, for a long time. The street fair was not as great a monetary success as the firemen hoped it would be and several bills of unexpected proportion served to largely cut down the amount that fell to the share of the firemen.

The finances of the department are in such condition that it is doubtful whether the Valley Association convention can be held in Sayre this year.

It is hoped that many matters relating to the future conduct and policy of the fire companies may be permanently settled at this time.

### EMERY ACCEPTS

Ex-Senator Lewis Emery, Jr., the Lincoln Republican and Democratic nominee for Governor, has finished writing his letter of acceptance of the nominations tendered to him by the two parties, and on Monday of next week it will be given to the public. In his letter, the veteran fighter against corruption has very tactfully made complete the fusion movement among the workers in both political parties, and those who have had the good fortune of having read it declare that it will be enthusiastically received by the voters of both parties, and by all citizens of the state who are anxious for a sweeping change in the political conditions in the state.

Mr. Emery's colleagues on the fusion ticket, are Jeremiah S. Black, of York county, nominee for Lieutenant Governor; William T. Creasy, of Columbia county, Auditor General; and John J. Green, of Philadelphia, nominee for Secretary of Internal Affairs.

### CORRECT, NEIGHBOR

New sidewalks are being put down in West Sayre, which nearly reach South Waverly, on Keystone avenue, making a continuous walk to Waverly. The old footpaths are rapidly disappearing by the putting down of cement walks, which adds very much to the appearance of the street and also to the residences. ## HAS RESIGNED AS MANAGER

A. H. Sawtelle Has Severed His Connection With the Valley Telephone Company—Has Accepted Another Position

A. H. Sawtelle, who has been manager of the Valley Telephone Company since that company was organized, has resigned. He handed in his resignation last Thursday, and it will go into effect about August 10.

Mr. Sawtelle has been very successful in the management of the telephone company, and has built it up so that it is doing a large, successful business, and has distanced all competitors in the territory that it covers.

He resigns his present position to take up a more desirable one with the Manhattan Co-operative Real Estate company. This company has large holdings in the vicinity of New York city, and does a business that extends over a large section of the country. Mr. Sawtelle will not leave Sayre but will continue to reside here, and will manage its business in this vicinity.

No announcement has yet been made as to who will succeed to the management of the telephone company.

## RACE ANNOUNCED WITHOUT AUTHORITY

"Harry P" and "Gilbert H" Did Not Race at the Athens Driving Park Today

The whistle blew No. 35, which is the number of the section of the Lehigh shop alarm system in and about the round house. No fire was discovered, and it was ascertained that some one, either through malice or accident, had broken the glass in front of one of the auxiliary No. 35 boxes, and pulled the alarm lever. It was stated by some men working in the vicinity that a small boy was seen to run away from the point where the broken box is located, and it is thought that he sent in the alarm just to hear the whistle blow.
