Cronstadt Mutiny Drives Him from Peterhof.

CRUISER UNDER RED FLAG.

Crew Seizes Ship and Kills Commanding Officers.

GENERAL MARKGRAFFSKY SLAIN.

Says Russian Revolutionist Leader; "Fire and Revolt-Will Spread to Utmost Corners of Empire"-Canr's Cruiser at Revel Flying Red Fing After Crew Had Murdered All Who Opponed Them on Vessel - Their success May Involve Whole Baltle Squadron In Revolt-Chief of Gondarmerle at Otwock Shot Down. Martial Law Proclaimed.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 3. - The czar and the imperial family have fied rom the palace at Peterbof and have taken refuge at Tsarskoe-Selo.

When the firing began at Cronstadt furing the night there ensued a wild panic in the imperial palace at Peterhof, as the palace lies under the guns of the fortress. All preparations had been made in advance to fiee to Tsarskoe-Selo, but the report affoat that the imperor and his family actually had fled in the middle of the night is denied. Later at the chancellery of the mperial bousehold it was explained that on account of "dampness" at Peterhof arrangements had been made

to Tsarskoe-Selo, which is about fifteen miles from St. Petersburg and is the samp of the guard regiments from June to the end of August.

Although the mutinies at Sveaborg save been ended and the one at Cronstadt has been practically put down. the outlook is still very black. The revolutionists, whose hands were sud-dealy forced by the premature rising at Svesborg, are apparently undaunted at these initial reverses and intend to persist in their programme of callng a general strike tomorrow or Mon-

The evew of the Russian cruiser Asia, which was sent to Abo, has hoisted the red flag. The vessel has left in the direction of Sveaborg. Grand Duke Nicholas received sessage shortly after midnight saying that the loyal portion of the crew of

the cruiser Pamyat Azova had made prisoners of the mutineers and turned them over to soldiers on shore.

One of the leaders of the revolutionists with whom a representative spoke last night boasted that the word had gone forth and that fire and revolt would spread to the corners of the empire. His closing words to the correspondent were, "Now watch Revel, Riga and Liban."

The news of the mutiny on board the armed cruiser Pamyat Azova off the Esthonian coast is fraught with enormous possibilities. The crew of this ressel rose and killed the commander and four officers. Ambassador Meyer has received a dispatch from the American consul at Revel saving that the Pamyat Azova had entered that port with the red fing at her masthead. should the cruiser under the flag of the mutineers sail to the northward all armed, surround the camp. A reand appear in the presence of the main squadron in the gulf of Finland the loyalty of the crews of these vessels would perhaps be put to a stronger test than they could stand. Although the admiralty claims that the squadron off Sveaborg did not waver in its allegiance, there is something mysterious about the reports of their actions which warrants the suspicion

that all is not right aboard. Only two ships fired on the mutineers, the others remaining on the horison, as if the admiral were not sure

that they could be depended upon. The mutiny on the Pamyat Azova may possibly raise international complications, as in the eyes of the law this ruiser, like the Kniaz Potenkine in the Black sea in the summer of 1965, is a pirate. SENATOR WILL FIGHT

McCarren Wants to Have Dixon Judgment Quashed.

Widow Claims She Was Acknowledged as Common Law Wife of Brooklyn Man and Thought It a Legal Union.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.-Lawyer Sam-

uel S. Whitehouse of the law firm of Morris & Whitehouse, representing Senator Patrick H. McCarren, appeared in the special term of the Brooklyn supreme court and made an application to Justice Truman C White for an order to show cause why judgment in the case against him of Mrs. Mary H. Dixon of Brooklyn should not be set aside. Mrs. Dixon received a judgment by default in the suit she brought against the senator. In the papers attached to the application Lawyer Whitehouse admits that Senator McCarren was served with a summons on June 28 at the Kings County Democratic club, but declares 15c. that Senator McCarren never received a copy of the complaint and had no knowledge of the nature of the suit brought against him by Mrs. Dixon until the facts became known through Belts the newspapers.

It is thought that in granting ar order directing that a sheriff's jury assess damages in the suit of Mrs. Mary H. Dixon against State Senator Patrick H. McCarren for \$200,000 Judge Truman C. White has brought about a remarkable state of affairs. The order was served on Sheriff Flaher ty, who is McCarren's most active po litical enemy in Kings county. Whether this will be an aid to Mrs. Dixon in HOSIETY her suit is a question that is having wide speculation among the complainant's friends.

Application for the order was made on the ground that McCarren had fall.
