CZAR IN PANIC Gronstadt Mutiny Drives Him from Peterhof. CRUISER UNDER RED FLAG. Crew Seizes Ship and Kills Commanding Officers.

GENERAL MARKGRAFFSKY SLAIN. "Now Watch Revel, Riga and Libau," Says Russian Revolutionist Leader. "Fire and Revolt Will Spread to Utmost Corners of Empire."-Czar's Cruiser at Revel Flying Red Flag After Crew Had Murdered All Who Opposed Them on Vessel - Their Success May Involve Whole Baltic Squadron in Revolt - Chief of Gen. Markgrafsky at Otswok Shot Down. Martial Law Proclaimed.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 3. - The czar and the imperial family have fled from the palace at Peterhof and have taken refuge at Tsarsko-Selo. When the firing began at Cronstadt during the night there ensued a wild panic in the imperial palace at Peterhof, as the palace lies under the guns of the fortress. All preparations had been made in advance to flee to Tsarsko-Selo, but the report about that the emperor and his family actually had fled in the middle of the night is denied. Later at the chancellery of the imperial household it was explained that on account of "dampness" at Peterhof arrangements had been made

GRAND DUKE NICHOLAS NICHOLAIVICH. for the return of the imperial family to Tsarsko-Selo, which is about fifteen miles from St. Petersburg and is the camp of the guard regiments from June to the end of August.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.-Admiral Train, commanding the Asiatic station, is a report to the navy department says that while the fleet was at Kobe, Mr. Matsumoto, president of the Kawasaki Dockyard company and a graduate of Yale college, presented to the fleet a handsome silver football challenge cup, which is to be played for each year, and the name of the winning ship is to be engraved thereon.

OHIO CITY Ablaze. COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 3.-The entire business portion of Howard, in Knox county, was burned, the authorities say by incendiaries. The burned section includes West Rich's general store, the lodge rooms of the Odd Fellows, Miss Henderson's millinery store, James Hess' meat market and grocery. Jordan Resigns Powers. SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 3.-It is reported that President David Starr Jordan of Leland Stanford Junior university will no longer be able to appoint and dismiss professors. The change was brought about through the passing by the board of trustees of a resolution under which President Jordan resigns with his power of appointment and dismissal.

INDORSE W. J. BRYAN Michigan Democrats Name Kimmerle For Governor. TAGGART CHARGES TO BE DROPPED State Convention Assembled at Detroit in For Nebraska as Presidential Nominee of the Party in 1909.

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 3.-Indorsement of William J. Bryan for president in 1908, the defeat of a resolution calling upon the national democratic committee to investigate the charges made against National Chairman Thomas E. Taggart and demand his resignation if they were proved, and the nomination of Charles H. Kimmerle of Cassopolis for governor over Stanley E. Parkhill of Owosso, the only other candidate, after a spirited ballot were the features of the democratic state convention.

Re-enforcing Frontier Guards. BERLIN, Aug. 3.-The recent disorders in Russian Poland have caused the Prussian government to re-enforce the frontier gendarmes. The Russian guards along the frontier also have been strengthened.

Water Front Fight. Oyster Bay Commissioners Tear Down Piers and Stone Walls. OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Aug. 3.-The Oyster Bay board of highway commissioners, commanding a force of twenty-five Italian laborers, technically demolished piers and stone walls obstructing what is known as the shore road, which skirts Sagamore Hill and is a favorite equestrian path of President Roosevelt.

Utter Holds Up Pool Selling. WOONSOCKET, R. I., Aug. 3.-The race meeting at the Woonsocket track, which was to last until Aug. 11, was canceled by the management, which had been notified by the police that any further attempt to sell pools on the races would be followed by arrest. The police were ordered by Governor Utter to stop pool selling. Several hundred persons were at the track, but before the first event was called they were notified of the action of the governor and the gate money was refunded.

FATAL ELECTION AFFRAY. Fight at Memphis Polling Booth-One Dead, Two Badly Hurt. MEMPHIS, Tenn., Aug. 3.-J. G. Wellington, a saloon keeper, was killed, W. J. Cooke, a judge of election, is fatally wounded and B. E. Conn less seriously injured in a fight at a polling place a few minutes after the closing of the polls for the election of county officers.

Baltimore Society Man Killed. BALTIMORE, Aug. 3.-Lycurus Winchester, twenty-seven years old, one of the bandsmen of Baltimore's society men, was instantly killed about 1 o'clock in the morning by being struck by an electric car while returning from a suburban resort. Mrs. Winchester has been summoned from the home of her father, Dallas C. Pratt of New Rochelle, N. Y.

Convention Indorses Bryan. HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Aug. 3.-The Democratic convention for the Fifth district named Joseph S. Miller, former commissioner of internal revenue, for congress. The resolutions indorses Bryan.

INVICIBLE HANDICAP. Handelson Gets Rich Stake at Brighton Beach. NEW YORK, Aug. 3.-On a muddy track and backed down from 8 to 6 to 6-4 to 5 Handelson, runner up in the Brooklyn and Suburban handicaps, won the rich Invincible handicap, one mile and a quarter, at Brighton Beach, defeating Coy Maid after a terrific drive all through the stretch by a head, with Cederstrom third. The time was 2:02 1/2.

SENATOR WILL FIGHT McCarren Wants to Have Dixon Judgment Quashed. BABY PATRICK 'H. MCCARREN, JR. Widow Claims She Was Acknowledged as Common Law Wife of Brooklyn Man and Thought It a Legal Union.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.-Lawyer Samuel S. Whitehouse of the law firm of Morris & Whitehouse, representing Senator Patrick H. McCarren, appeared in the special term of the Brooklyn supreme court and made an application to Justice Truman C. White for an order to show cause why judgment in the case against him of Mrs. Mary H. Dixon of Brooklyn should not be set aside.

Application for the order was made on the ground that McCarren had failed to appear in answer to a notice served on him on June 28, at the headquarters of the Kings County Democracy, in the Jefferson building in Brooklyn. Mrs. Dixon is asking for damages on the ground that she was McCarren's common law wife and that they have a son for whom she asks support.

CRUISE OF THE SPRAY. Young Roosevelt Would Cross the Pacific in Sailboat. OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Aug. 3.-Archie Roosevelt has just returned from a cruise to Newport, R. I., with Captain Slocum on board the Spray. The voyage was made in one day, and Archie came back with a tremendous amount of nautical wisdom stored under his sailor hat.

Trade Agreement With Spain. WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.-All preliminary negotiations between the United States and Spain for the reduction of the tariff on American products entering Spain in consideration of the reduction of the tariff on champagne and several other Spanish products have been concluded. The United States will now be classed among the most favored nations by Spain.

Colonial Marriages Bill Passed. LONDON, Aug. 3.-The colonial marriages bill has passed its third reading in the house of commons. It provides for the legalization in the United Kingdom of marriage with a dead wife's sister contracted anywhere in the British possessions.

Harry to See Kaiser's War Game. WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.-Brigadier General Thomas H. Barry of the general staff has left Washington for New York and will sail tomorrow for Europe to attend the German army maneuvers.
