FAY TEMPLETON WEDS.

Well Known Musical Comedy Star Marries Pittsburgh Man.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 3.—Announcement is made of the marriage here of Fay Templeton, the actress, to William Patterson of Pittsburgh. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. F. G. Steinmetz at the home of Dr. Giles, a brother-in-law of the bride, at Ridley Park, a suburb. Immediately after the wedding the couple departed for a bridal tour.

Stageland was considerably surprised at the news of Miss Temple-

ton's marriage. She is under contract to act this season, but no announcement has yet been made of her plans.

The greatest secrecy was thrown about the wedding. When the Rev. Mr. Steinmetz was summoned to marry the couple he supposed it was for a social visit and when he was informed after the wedding that Fay Osborne was the well known actress was much surprised. There were no witnesses to the marriage outside the members of the family.

Mr. Patterson is the son of a wealthy lumber merchant and is about thirty-seven or thirty-eight years old.

Fay Templeton is probably the best known musical comedy star in the country and has been identified with leading comic operas and extravaganzas for the last twenty years.

The last production in which Miss Templeton starred was "Forty-five Minutes from Broadway." She was for several seasons with old Weber and Fields forces in New York and was popular for her clever rendition of comical songs and for her imitations of well known stage folk.

Many Big Guns Damaged.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 3.—The board of inquiry appointed to investigate the collision of the battleships Illinois and Alabama continued its sessions on board the Illinois. On the Illinois four of the six inch guns on the starboard side forward were damaged, and a portion of the forward gun deck was sprung. The Alabama sustained severe damage to two of her six inch guns, one of them being bent badly. Both ships will have to go to a navy yard for repairs. Seaman Corbett, who was injured on the Illinois, was more seriously hurt than was at first reported. One of his legs was amputated on the day following the collision, and it has been found necessary to amputate an arm also.

ERIE TRAIN RIDERS

GIVE OFFICERS A RUN

Were Riding on Engine Pilot—Gun Persuades One to Halt—Given Fifteen Days

Waverly—When Erie train No. 14 pulled into this place yesterday at 5 o'clock, three young men made a flying leap from the head end of the engine and scurried down the tracks. The Waverly police were there to greet them and the cracks of officer Gridley's revolver startled the bystanders, but only served to make the fugitives run faster. The police started in pursuit and officer Gridley, who pressed a horse and buggy into service rounded up two of them near the furniture factory. Erie detective Fitzgerald, who had followed them from Elmira, captured the other one hidden in a garden in Howard street. The man started to run but when the officer pulled his revolver he decided to surrender.

At police headquarters they gave their names as George Shevers and Thomas Hawkins of Chicago, and Henry Sanford of New York. A report was circulated that they were prisoners who had escaped from officers on train 14, and fully 200 people gathered at the police headquarters. The charge placed against them was training and Justice Hoagland sentenced them to 15 days each in the county jail at Owego.
