British Premier Favours Home Rule Measure.

CABINET FRAMING PROVISIONS.

King Edward Ready to Give His Assent to Act For Erin's Self Government—House of Lords Opposes It.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—The new Liberal parliament has adjourned. Besides the principal measure before the house of commons, the education bill, almost all the measures promised in the king's opening speech either were passed or forced to an advanced stage in committee.

It is not to be doubted that the Liberal leaders propose to carry out every pledge made to their Irish and Labor allies in parliament. It is announced by T. P. O'Connor that the next great measure by Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman will be a home rule bill for Ireland.

FUNERAL OF W. H. SHAW HELD AT SHESHEQUIN

Odd Fellows Had Charge of Service—Immense Concourse Pay Final Respects to the Deceased

Athens—The funeral of W. H. Shaw at Sheshequin yesterday was an occasion of unusual importance in the valley. His life compasses the greater part of the past century that has witnessed the great progress in the industrial and commercial development of the Susquehanna valley, and he has been one of the prominent actors in the arena of its progress.

All who have known Mr. Shaw have been impressed with his acute perceptions and the sentiments of honor that formed the mainspring of his words and actions. He has not been a meteor in the galaxy of stars, but his influence has been such as to impress everyone with a sense of his worth.

The funeral cortege from Troy was under charge of Brothers Brooks, Wood, Greenough and Pratt of Hector lodge, I. O. O. F., and the services at Sheshequin were in charge of Brothers Chubbuck and Allen of Rome lodge, of which Mr. Shaw was a member.

Delegations were present from Burlington, Rome, Towanda, Athens, Sheshequin and Litchfield, and the attendance was so large that a great number could not get into the church.

Rev. Dr. Simpson gave a very eloquent sermon, dwelling upon the character and the possibilities of the deceased, saying that he had never been in a position to bring out the latent resources of his endowment; that however much he may have enjoyed the esteem of his fellowmen, that he would have, under different surroundings, made greater advancement. God lifts man up to a place of dignity and responsibility, and Mr. Shaw had a royal character that was worthy of the highest emulation. Mr. Shaw will be remembered as one of the true men of the age.
