BROAD STREET TO BE EXTENDED

Most of the Necessary Land to Be Given by Hon. Byram L. Winters. Waverly—Broad street is to be extended east to the old Ellistown road, and if the present plan works this street will also be connected with the Milltown road, bringing the people of that place in closer touch with Waverly than they now are with Sayre.

After a debate in which Trustee Lang and Attorney Hawkes came sharply together the resolution which was offered by W. C. Farley that the street be opened by the village, was unanimously carried by the board of trustees last evening. Mr. Winters was present and explained his plans to the trustees and signified his willingness to indemnify the village from expense in acquiring the land of Frank Blazinski, either by purchase or by condemnation proceedings. He also stated that he would give the land belonging to him which was necessary for the street. He said that he had taken stock in a firm which employed skilled workmen in the manufacture of tools and was negotiating for the location of the plant here; that he would give the land for the plant. Mr. Lang contended that his statement which indemnified the village should be embodied in the resolution. Mr. Winters quickly agreed to this and was heartily applauded. Mr. Blazinski was present and strenuously objected to the street being opened, claiming that it was his intention to erect a store on the land to be taken.

Trustees Order New Walks. Pay Off Bonds and Part of the Paving Contract. Waverly—At last night's meeting of the board of trustees there was just a quorum present and considerable delay in starting was caused by trouble with the electric lights. A large number of spectators sat sweltering throughout the session. A resolution was adopted requiring that all sidewalks on Elizabeth street must be of stone or concrete and approved by the board.

The bond for the steam roller of \$1,000 with \$45 interest which is due was ordered paid, also the village hall bond of \$1,000, with interest and commission. Jas. Smith appeared for the Cayuta hose company, stating that the plumbing was defective. The matter was referred to President Lawrence with power to act. Floyd Curran and S. C. Hall appeared before the board complaining of the condition of the Waverly street roadway on Walker's hill. The matter was referred to the street committee.

The expenditures of the evening including the bonds and \$2,200 paid to J. J. Higgins on the pavement contract amounted to about \$5,000. The board adjourned till Friday night at 7:30 o'clock.

BISHOP'S CASE POSTPONED. Waverly—The hearing of Walter Bishop for violation of the excise law, which was to have come before Justice Hoagland this morning, was postponed one week, the bonds remaining the same. Attorney J. J. O'Conner, attorney for the Briggs Brewing Company, appeared for Mr. Bishop and asked for an adjournment, stating that he was unable to get his witnesses today. Attorney D. W. Allen also appeared for the defense. The request was granted.
