### DENTAL OFFICES BURGLARIZED

Gold Only Was Stolen, and Doors Were Locked as Usual When Offices Were Opened in the Morning.

When Drs. Snook, Hart and Switzer came to their respective dental offices yesterday morning everything appeared to be in its usual order, and it was not until they each had occasion to use some gold that they discovered that the entire supply had disappeared. Just when the offices were entered and the gold stolen is uncertain. It may have occurred at any time between Saturday night and Monday morning. The work was evidently done by professionals, and it is the opinion of the police that it was done by some one who is making a specialty of that kind of work, as reports of similar robberies have frequently appeared in different parts of the country.

The thieves showed themselves to be experts in this line of work, for nothing in the offices had been disturbed sufficiently to attract the attention, even of the owners, until the loss of the gold was discovered. A close examination revealed the fact that the offices had been ransacked very thoroughly, but every thing had been put back in its place, and only the gold was missing. The doors had all evidently been unlocked and locked up again, and the only thing broken was a drawer in Dr. Harts' office which had been pried open.

There are doctors' offices in the same buildings with the burglarized dental offices, and any one could enter or leave without attracting attention.
