SELLS ITS TROLLEYS

New Haven Road Disposes of Its Electric Lines.

MANY MILLIONS ARE INVOLVED.

Proposed Massachusetts Law Against Traffic Monopoly Apparently the Cause of the Sudden Transfer.

BOSTON, Aug. 17.—Details of the transfer by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad company of street car systems valued at many millions of dollars leaked out in this city, and, although official confirmation in railroad circles is lacking, it was learned that the railroad company had taken steps to divest itself of practically all of its street car property in southern New England. The transfer, which follows closely on the announced intention of the Massachusetts authorities to retain in this state control of Massachusetts street railway corporations, has been made to an association known as the New England Security Investment company.

According to information obtained here, the transfer is said to involve the street car lines owned by the New Haven road in both Massachusetts and Connecticut, with connecting lines to Rhode Island and New York. A report from New Haven, however, indicated the probability that the Connecticut lines might not figure in the transfer, due, it was said, to the fact that under the charter of the Consolidated Railway company, holding company of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad company, such a transfer would be unnecessary. There was no leading official of the railroad in this city who could state the exact scope of the deal. It was announced unofficially, however, the railroad company had disposed of its entire group of trolley lines, and later this news was confirmed by an undoubted authority, with the comment that its publication was premature.

For over three years the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad company has been acquiring street railways in the state of Massachusetts, and recently the holdings of the company reached such proportions that the matter was made the subject of a special message by Governor Guild to the legislature on the eve of its adjournment last June. Attorney General Dana Malone also interested himself in the matter, and, acting in accordance with the views of the governor, he drafted and submitted to the legislature a bill intended to prevent a continuance in this state of the control of the trolley car companies by steam railroad systems. A brief consideration of the matter by the legislative committee on street railways brought about the suggestion that a test case be made, and the attorney general set about preparing a case which would eventually receive a ruling from the Massachusetts supreme court. While this case was being prepared the attorney general, desiring certain information in connection with the car lines owned by the railroad, asked President Mellen, through Chairman Jackson of the state railroad commission, to furnish it to him.

The information asked for by Mr. Malone was transmitted to him, and almost simultaneously the fact that the railroad company had transferred its holdings became known.

State Will Blend Its Own Whisky.
COLUMBIA, S. C., Aug. 17.—The board of directors of the South Carolina state dispensary has adopted a resolution whereby the institution will blend its own whiskies in the future. This means a curtailment in the purchase of case goods from the various whisky houses. The institution will buy its whiskies in bulk from bonded warehouses and blend and bottle them in the state dispensary. Ex-Member of Douma Arrested.
ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 17.—Dispatches received here from Penza, the capital of the province of Penza and located at the junction of the Sura and Volga rivers, report the arrest of another member of the late parliament, M. Vragoff, under circumstances quite as compromising as those in the Onipko case. Vragoff being charged with complicity in the murder of Lieutenant Petroff of the rural police and the wounding of a sergeant of the same force.

Earthquake in St. Vincent.
KINGSTOWN, Island of St. Vincent, Aug. 17.—An earthquake was experienced here on the night of Aug. 14, and several shocks and tremors were felt on the island of St. Lucia. There were four shocks here on the night of Aug. 2, and on the island of St. Lucia within the space of eight hours there were fifty-one distinct shocks. The continuance of earth tremors since the severe shock of last February, chiefly in St. Lucia, is causing considerable anxiety.

LITTLE ITALIAN BOY TERRIBLY INJURED

Nick Elmo, Aged Seven, Knocked Down and Run Over by Lehigh Switch Engine at Waverly

Waverly—Nick Elmo, a little Italian boy, apparently about 7 years of age, who was staying with his brother, Dominick Elmo, of Keystone avenue, met with a frightful accident at the Fulton street crossing at about 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Lehigh switch engine No. 687, with several cars attached, had backed up from Sayre and stopped just east of the crossing, the last car close to the sidewalk. Conductor Wallace and Engineer Chas. Rolfe and brakeman Van Orman, all of Sayre, were the crew. The little fellow was just crossing when the train was started suddenly and he was knocked down and the wheels crushed his left leg in a terrible manner, and his left arm was fractured.

The boy was carried into the Fulton House and Drs. Tucker and Betowski attended him and made him as comfortable as possible. The ambulance from the Robert Packer hospital at Sayre was sent for and he was taken to that institution. It was found necessary to amputate the leg in the upper third. Both bones of the forearm were found to be broken.

It was at first thought that the boy could not recover, but his condition was very satisfactory this afternoon.

FOUND GUILTY

Waverly—John Gleason, the young man who was arrested last Wednesday night for throwing things about and creating a disturbance in the opera house was given a hearing this morning and found guilty. He was fined \$7 and in imposing the fine Judge Hoagland stated that the rowdism that had prevailed at the opera house should cease and that so far as he was concerned he would do his share toward stopping it, and the next one found guilty would probably suffer a much heavier penalty.

Ordinance No. 96.

Authorizing the construction of a public sewer beginning at the west bank of the Susquehanna river about eight hundred feet south of Sayre Water Company's pumping station, and extending westerly over the lands of the Consolidated Real Estate Company and the lands of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company to Lehigh avenue; thence northerly on Lehigh avenue to Hayden street; thence westerly on Hayden street to Desmond street; thence northerly on Desmond street to Lehigh avenue; thence northerly on Lehigh avenue to Cayuga street; thence westerly on Cayuga street to Wilbur avenue, in the Borough of Sayre, Penna.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Sayre, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same: That believing it to be for the general health and public welfare of the citizens of said borough, that a system of public sewers be adopted and the same is hereby adopted for said borough. Beginning at a point at the west bank of the Susquehanna river about eight hundred feet south of the Sayre Water Company's pumping station and extending in a westerly direction over the lands of the Consolidated Real Estate Company and lands of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company to Lehigh avenue; thence northerly on Lehigh avenue to Hayden street; thence westerly on Hayden street to Desmond street; thence northerly on Desmond street to Lehigh avenue; thence northerly on Lehigh avenue to Cayuga street; thence westerly on Cayuga street to Wilbur avenue, all in the Borough of Sayre, State of Pennsylvania, in accordance with an Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, approved May 15th, 1880, entitled "An Act to enable boroughs to construct sewerage systems, assess and collect the cost thereof," and the cost thereof be paid by general taxation, by an assessment levied upon all the property subject to taxation in said borough. Said sewer to be constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications made by Williams & Whitman, Inc., dated Sep. 1, 1905, as to size of pipes, depths of trenches and grade. But to be so arranged as to take the surface drainage until such time as a Disposal Plant for the disposal of the sewerage may be required.

Sec. 2. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith be and the same are hereby repealed. The foregoing Ordinance was unanimously adopted by the Sayre Borough Council at a meeting held Monday evening, August 6, 1906.

Ordinance No. 97.

An ordinance authorizing the increase of the indebtedness of the Borough of Sayre, Pa., by the sum of twenty thousand dollars.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Sayre, Pa., and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same: That twenty-five bonds of the denomination of one thousand dollars each, bearing interest at the rate of four per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, April 1st and October 1st, of each and every year, at the office of the treasurer of said borough, be issued. Said bonds to be numbered from one to twenty-five, inclusive, and bond No. 1, of said issue be made payable on the 1st day of October 1911, and the rest of said bonds be payable, one each year on October 1st, in the order of their number until all are paid. And that the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds be used for the purpose of paying off or redeeming five thousand dollars of the present indebtedness of said Borough, and so much of the balance as may be necessary, shall be used for the purpose of constructing the trunk line of a sewer for the sewer system authorized to be constructed by said Borough.

Sec. 2. That a tax of one mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of said Borough, be and the same is hereby levied each and every year, commencing in 1907, for the payment of said indebtedness and interest, until the same are paid.

Sec. 3. That the attorneys of said Borough shall prepare a suitable form for the bonds hereby (and in accordance with the Acts of Assembly relating thereto) authorized to be issued and submit the same to the Finance Committee of the Borough Council, for approval, and when the same shall be approved by said committee, the said committee shall have the same engraved and prepared, and an order shall be drawn on the treasurer of said borough, to pay the expense thereof.

Sec. 4. That the Burgess of the said Borough of Sayre, is hereby authorized and empowered to sign the said bonds and coupons attached thereto, the same to be countersigned by the Secretary of the said Borough Council, who shall affix the corporate seal of said Borough thereto.

Sec. 5. That the Finance Committee of the said Borough Council, is hereby authorized and empowered to advertise for bids for the sale of said bonds and also to sell the same to the highest bidder or bidders, at a price not less than the par value thereof.

Sec. 6. That all bonds issued by virtue of this ordinance and the Acts of Assembly authorizing the same shall be and become a part of the funded debt of the said Borough of Sayre, and for the payment of the principal of the said bonds, and the semi-annual interest accruing thereon, the faith, honor and credit of said Borough of Sayre, are hereby pledged.

Sec. 7. That ordinance No. 95, passed July 2, 1906, entitled "An Ordinance authorizing the increase of the indebtedness of the Borough of Sayre, Pa." be and the same is hereby repealed. The foregoing ordinance was unanimously adopted by the Sayre Borough Council at a regular meeting held Monday evening, August 6, 1906.
