BOYLE DEMANDS BIG DAMAGES

Brings Suit Against the W. S. & A. Traction Company for Injuries Sustained a Month Ago

In county court today Paul E. Maynard, attorney for Michael Boyle began an action against the Waverly, Sayre & Athens Traction Company to recover damages in the sum of \$5,000 for injuries alleged to have been sustained by Mr. Boyle at the hands of the defendant company. A month or more ago Mr. Boyle was driving across Elmer avenue at Steveson street, when his rig was struck by a trolley car. Mr. Boyle was thrown from the wagon and injured, the wagon was damaged, and the animal he was driving was so badly hurt that he had to be shot.

In his complaint Mr. Boyle alleges that the trolley car was running at a high rate of speed and that no warning signals were given. He laid the matter before his attorney, and as the Traction company would not adjust the matter on Mr. Boyle's statement of claim, suit was brought today.

The case will be an interesting one, and will be watched closely by the legal fraternity as several fine points of law are involved. Two years ago Mr. Boyle was injured by being struck by a trolley car, and at that time the company settled.

JEAN FORSYTH HAS DIPHTHERIA

Dread Malady Again Makes Its Appearance in Sayre

Jean Forsyth, daughter of Grant Forsyth, of No. 213 West Lockhart street, is suffering from diphtheria. The girl is about fourteen years old, and she was attacked by the disease on Saturday night and Dr. C. L. Stevens of Athens was called. At that time her condition was considered critical, but today she is reported as slightly better.

This is the first case of the malady to appear in Sayre in nearly a year. Last summer there were several cases in various parts of the borough, and in some instances death resulted.

BOUND TO BREAK UP TRAIN RIDING

Lehigh Detectives Are After Hoboes and Others Who Desire to Ride Free

The officials of the Lehigh Valley are bound to break up the practice of illegal train riding, and all the special officers of the company have been instructed to arrest violators of the law on sight. Detective Shaffer and his assistants are keeping a sharp lookout and every train that comes into the Sayre yards will be searched for the men who like to ride but who do not like to pay fare. The rule has been in vogue for some time and at various points along the line many offenders have been taken in custody.

TRACTION COMPANY WINS TAX SUIT

Judge Fanning Hands Down Decision in Which Sayre Borough Is Interested

Several court decisions of wide interest were handed down by Judge A. C. Fanning on Saturday afternoon. In the case in which the Waverly, Sayre & Athens Traction company is plaintiff and the Borough of Sayre and County of Bradford the defendants, the trolley company has won a decision by which they escape the payment of borough and county taxes for the year 1904, because during that year a law relative to the taxation of corporations took effect.

The lad's father settled the matter before any arrests were made.

The dead body of a man, evidently a farm laborer, was found lying in front of the Geneva station at an early hour yesterday morning. The man, whose identity is unknown, had been struck and killed by the cars. Special officer Johnson of this place is in Geneva today investigating the matter.

WILL PROBABLY COME UP TODAY

Watch Case Will Likely Be Investigated by the Grand Jury Today

The case of the commonwealth versus Jacob Solomon will probably come up before the grand jury today or tomorrow. Mr. Solomon is a member of the firm of Solomon Brothers, clothiers, on lower Desmond street, and the complaining witness is A. Atkin, who conducts a merchant tailoring establishment on West Lockhart street. It is alleged on the part of Mr. Atkin that one Sunday several weeks ago he and his wife left home leaving it in charge of a Polish girl named Annie Konetchsky. During the absence of Mr. Atkin and his wife it is alleged that Solomon visited the house three times and that while there he took a piece of rubber tissue such as is used to stiffen the bottom of pants legs. When Mr. Atkin returned his gold watch which had been left in his vest which hung in the tailoring establishment was also missing.

Mr. Atkin caused a warrant to be issued for Solomon's arrest, charging larceny, and after hearing the evidence Justice Carey held Solomon to the grand jury.

The case against Mr. Solomon is purely circumstantial and its disposition by the grand jury will be awaited with interest.


