REBELS TAKE TOWN. Cuban Insurgents in Possession of San Luis. SEVERAL KILLED AND WOUNDED. Fifty Rural Guards Captured—General Rodriguez Minimizes Affairs and Thinks the Revolt is Doomed.

HAYANA, Aug. 23.—The insurgents captured the city of San Luis, in the province of Pinar del Rio. Pinar Guerra's force of rebels appeared outside San Luis at 9:30 a. m. A severe fight followed, during which several men were killed or wounded on both sides.
