REBELS TAKE TOWN

Cuban Insurgenta In Posses sion of San Luis.

\$75,000.00 SEVERAL EILLED AND WOUNDED.

Pifty Rural Guarda Captured-Ger eral Redrigues Minimises Affair and Thinks the Revolt

HAVANA, Aug. 23.-The insurgents captured the city of San Luis, in the province of Pinar del Rio. Pino Guerra's force of rebels

peared outside San Luis at 9:30 a. m. A severe fight followed, during which several men were killed or wounded on both sides. Eventually the insurgents captured the town, and fifty rural guards are being beld prisoners.

The city of San Luis is situated near

the San Sebastian river and nine miles south by west of Pinar del Rio, cap-ltal of the province of that name. It is situated in a region noted for the roduction of tobacco and has a population of about 5,000. The agent of the Western railway at

San Luis station, which is a mile and one-third from the town, reported that the town had been taken by insurgents who had surrounded the station. The agent did not know the number killed or wounded, but believed it was small, The fighting was quickly over. General Rodriguez, commander of the

rural guard, after relating the incidents of the day, said to a press representa-

"You can tell the American people that Cuba is entirely competent to cope with the insurrection. The flood of rumors in all directions about the organization of insurrectionary bands in great numbers are not borne out by our reports or, so far as can be learned. by the facts. The result of the encounter at San Luis la still not known lefinitely, but it is known that we inflicted some losses on the enemy in that vicinty. The much talked of movement in Santa Clara province has not been sacountered and no insurrectionists have been seen there by our forces. We

have just equipped and sent out in various directions 300 volunteers under competent officers. We have plenty of Remingtons and ammuaition Ar all who enlist at present and more has been ordered from the United states. Besides, we have thousands of old but serviceable guns. "We believe the loyal people are taking up arms for the government faster than the insurgents are increasing." While the foregoing is typical of the

utterances of government officials, there are evidences of threatening in-ercases of the insurrectionists. In the province of Santa Clara the disaffecden is widespread, and in the province of Mayana a great many people are in sympathy with the insurgents. In ome cases whole communities appear to have been carried away by the recrudescence of insurrectionary times. gen rebellion is still uncertain.

WHITNEY OUT OF RACE.

Hay State Democratic Nomination May Go to Douglas.

BOSTON, Aug. 23.—Developments in the coutest for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination had been so rapid within the past twenty four hours that political lenders in this city confessed that they were bewildered. District Attorney John B. Moran is the central igure in the complicated situation.

The developments of the day drop ped Henry M. Whitney from the contest for governor, brought former Gov-ernor William L. Douglas into the field as a conditional candidate and placed John B. Moran where he may bring about party harmony or continue a contest against a number of Democratic leaders who are opposed to his candidacy.

Following closely the publication of the announcement that Mr. Douglas would enter the field against Governor Guild provided he was assured of a unanimous nomination came the appearance in this city of Henry J. Skefflugton of Revere, a personal friend of former Governor Douglas After a conference with Josiah Quincy chairman of the Democratic state committee, Skeffington was closeted with Moran. His purpose in visiting the district attorney was said to be to bring pressure to bear on Moran to withdraw from the race and thereby prepare the way for a convention which would nominate Douglas.

While the Moran-Skeffington confer ence was in progress Whitney in letter to Chairman Quincy announced his absolute withdrawal from the contest and pledged his hearty support to Governor Douglas.

With Whitney positively out of the race and Moran's attitude such that his withdrawal in favor of Douglas seemed a very remote possibility, prominent Democratic politicians said that the probable makeup of the state ticket is very uncertain.

District Attorney Moran when seen at his office declined to give an intimation as to the course he would pursue.

Ohio Democrats Nominate. COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 23.-Samuel A. Hoskins for secretary of state; Charles W. Maupert for state school commissioner, Rodney J. Diegle for state diary and food commissioner and George E. Nyswonger for member of board of public works constituted the ticket named by the Ohio Democratic convention here. The day was close and sultry, few delegates were coats, and many sought cooler places outside the hall before the final adjournment. this last fact making possible the casting of the votes of several delegation by unauthorized persons during the last few ballots. A number of counties were challenged and several persons put out of the hall for such imprope voting, but it did not seem to affect the result materially in any case.

Moke Smith For Governor of Georgia primaries in Georgia seem to have resulted in favor of Hoke Smith for governor. The Journal, supporting Hoke Smith, has received unofficial returns from ninety of the 145 counties of the state. Of these Mr. Smith is reported to have carried eighty-three. Fulton county, the home of Mr. Howell and Mr. Smith, is claimed for Smith by 2,000 majority.

TERRORISTS CONTINUE ACTIVE

Count Fermor, Ald-de-camp to Gov ernor of Warsaw, Fatally Wounded by Revolutionists-Other Outrages.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 23.-On account of the utter inability of the police in various parts of the empire to cope with the ordinary forms of law essness which are flourishing under the cover of the revolutionary movement a group of foreign detective agencies has applied to the minister of the interior for a concession for the formation of a private police detective agency, which will protect the property and lives of its patrons from ordinary criminal attempts. The chief field of activity of the proposed agency is western Russia and Poland. A considerable number of detectives, among them English, German and French operatives, already have arrived at Warsaw and are studying the language of the country and the conditions there.

Terrorist attacks on police and officials continue throughout the empire. At Warsaw Count Fermor, a colonel of the general staff and aid-de-camp to the governor of Warsaw and who is a member of one of the most aristocratic Russian families, was fatally wounded by revolutionists. The count's assailants fied after firing ten shots. A patrol came up immediately after the affair and discharged a volley into the crowd, killing one man.
