JACKSON HOUSE AN OLD-TIMER

Built Nearly 250 Years Ago in Ports mouth, N. H.

Portsmouth, N. H.-Some of the "old-timers" in the way of houses in New England are in curious contrast to the houses of to-day. This is true in particular of the old farmhouses with their sloping roofs reaching almost to the ground and their great central chimneys so large at the base that in some of the old houses there are fireplaces seven feet across and five feet in depth.

The old Jackson house here is one of the most interesting of these ancient houses. This house was built in the year 1664, and is therefore almost 250 years old. Its sloping roof is one of its distinguishing features. Richard Jackson owned 26 acres of ground when he built the house is

thrifty man, as were most of the in habitants of that day. The old house has been the home of six generations of Jacksons, and it is still in the possession of the Jackson family. The house fronts on the river, and it is thought to be the oldest house in Portsmouth. The frame of the house is of oak and the timbers for the sill project into the lower rooms. Are haunted houses." This old house is haunted only by the associations of the long, long years since it was built.
