**BARNUM & BAILEY**  
**ARRIVED TODAY**

"Greatest on Earth" Gave the Finest Exhibition Ever Seen Here This Afternoon

Shortly after 4 o'clock this morning the first train carrying the working part of Barnum & Bailey circus arrived in the Upper Lehigh yards, and within a few hours there sprang up as if by magic a city of gray canvas on the Elmer avenue grounds. Despite the fact that there was no parade, this feature of the circus having been eliminated, the streets of Sayre were thronged with people at an early hour and by 10 o'clock the W. S. & A. Traction company was taxed to its fullest capacity, to carry people to the ground.

The big circus is here for the day only, and from appearances the residents of the three valley towns and the entire surrounding country have grasped the opportunity to witness "The Greatest on Earth." Eighty-one cars carried the paraphernalia, men and animals. The cars were divided into four trains. Hardly had the engines stopped when the work of unloading began. The men worked rapidly and quietly, but everywhere was system—a system which for its completeness has never been equaled by any traveling organization.

The exhibition is a marvel, and is the greatest, biggest and best that ever visited Sayre. Columns could be written on the many attractions, but space in a paper will not permit. A big crowd is in attendance this afternoon and this evening the big tents will be taxed to the limit. The show is remarkably free from disorderly characters and the police have thus far experienced no difficulty in maintaining order.

**MAY HAVE BEEN**  
**FATALLY INJURED**

Young Lad Met With a Most Unfortunate Accident Last Night

Almost pulseless and with his left leg below the knee crushed to a pulp John Brennan, Jr., son of John Brennan of Kingsbury avenue, Towanda, was brought here last night on No. 127 and removed in the ambulance to the Packer hospital. The leg was amputated at the knee. His condition today is regarded as critical.

The lad, who is only ten years old, was a victim of the car wheels, but just how he met with the accident which cost him his leg and may cause his death, is not known. It is presumed, however, that he attempted to get over a crossing on the Lehigh Valley at Towanda ahead of a shift of cars and was run down. He was discovered lying along the tracks by a yardman. A Towanda physician was called and bandaged the leg and then advised that the lad be brought here. He had lost a vast amount of blood, and when he was laid on the operating table at the hospital the pulse was scarcely perceptible.

It is not thought that the lad can recover.

**TROLLEY LINE IS**  
**BUILDING RAPIDLY**

No Longer Any Doubt as to the Corning - Waverly Electric Road

There is no longer any doubt in the minds of the promoters of the Elmira, Corning and Waverly trolley line that the road will be completed between Elmira and Waverly before the snow falls, nor is there much doubt that it will be in full operation. For several weeks past large gangs of workmen have been engaged in building roadbed east of Elmira and west of Waverly. Rapid progress has been made. In fact the grading is practically completed between Waverly and Coffey's crossing west of Wellsburg. This means that it will be a matter of but a few weeks when ties and rails can be laid.

The rails have been bought and the cars are being built. The promoters not only expect to have the Waverly end open this year, but hope to get to work on the Corning end of the line before the snow flies. Power will be furnished by the Elmira Water, Light and Railroad Company. The contract calls for its first use January 1, 1907, and in case either party is not ready to comply a big penalty is attached.
