NEW PACIFIC PEAK.

Volcanic Mountain Rises 700 Feet on Fire Island. WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—The treasury department received a brief report of a visit made by the officers of the revenue cutter Perry to the peak which recently sprang up on Fire Island.

The southern end of Fire Island consists of two long spits from a half to three-eighths of a mile in length and about fifteen feet above high water.

From the numerous crevices columns of steam and sulphurous gases continuously arise and form a cloud which is visible for more than thirty miles.

FOR A FINER VALPARAISO.

Wrecked City Will be Rebuilt on New and Splendid Lines. VALPARAISO, Aug. 25.—As the result of the splendid courage of the people and with the co-operation of the city government, Valparaiso will be rebuilt within a few years on finer and more beautiful lines than before the disaster of Aug. 16.

The rain caused most of the people to desert the tents which they have occupied since the earthquake and return to their houses.

HOT POLITICAL SCRAP.

Contesting Delegations May Go to Buffalo from Wayne County. LYONS, N. Y., Aug. 25.—The fight of the Hearst and anti-Hearst factions of the Democratic party for the control of the Wayne county Democratic committee was renewed here and probably will be taken before the state convention at Buffalo.

At the county district convention early this month County Chairman Charles P. Williams, a Hearst leader, was in control, and the delegates to the Buffalo convention, headed by himself, were instructed for Hearst for governor.

Hon. O. D. Kinsey will give a reception to Hon. Lewis Emery, Jr., candidate for governor, Hon. W. T. Creasy and George E. Mapes, who will be in Athens, September 4. The reception will be held September 4, from 3 to 5 p. m.
