The have wrought by the explosion indescribable. Bodies were so torn and mangled as to make identification mpossible. Some of them were headarmless or legless, lying among the blood dripping wreckage. Pieces of fiesh and clothing clung to the shattered rafters overhead, and some lodged in the branches of the elm trees which border the roadway, separating he premier's residence from the river. General Min, commander of the Seminovsky guard regiment, who sup-pressed the riots at Moscow in De-cember, was assassinated at Peterhof last night.

He was at the railway station with his family when he was killed.

The deed was committed by a young girl, who fired five shots from a revolver into his back, killing him intantly.

Mme. Min seized the assassin by the hand and held her until the police arrived. After her arrest the girl howed the police a bomb lying in he station, telling them to beware. This was the third successive atempt on the life of General Min, who was condemned to death by the terror-sta immediately after the Moscow reolt last December on account of the atern repression practiced by a bat-talion under his command and especial-ty for the wholesale execution of perns condemned by drumbend court nartial for being caught with arms in heir hands.

General Min was returning from the spital to his summer residence at Pe-erhof and had just greeted his wife and daughter on the platform when a ng woman, almost a girl, approached from behind and fired two shots to his back and then three more into his body as it sank to the ground Further shots were prevented by Mine. Min, who threw herself upon the mur-deress and selzed the hand which held the platol. The woman did not at-tempt to escape, but she cautioned Mma.
