1000 to be Opened Sept. 1. WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Mr. Miyakawa, the Japanese charge, called at the state department and advised Acting Secretary Adoo that Japan will open Dainy to the commerce of all nations after Sept. 1. It is to be a free port, and no import or export duty will be levied in articles of commerce imported or exported from Dainy.

PAKE BARON GOES FREE. HAMBURG, Aug. 28.—Ewald Konrad, alias Baron Cantos von Dobrowski, Donnersmark, who was alleged to have deserted his American wife at Paris, taking with him \$8,000 worth of jewels and some money belonging to her, and who was arrested here Aug. 23 on charge of robbery, was today discharged here, the court holding that he was not culpable under German law.

Woman Makes Queer Testament Concerning Pet. PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28.—"I wish my niece to take care of my little dog Daisy, if she be living at the time of my death, and do what she thinks best for her."

"I think it would be better to have her put out of the way, as I know she will grieve for me, dear little thing, but I want her taken care of if she is left to live." So deep was the attachment of Mrs. Anna B. Creighton, who died at 5179 Jefferson street, for a dog that had been her pet for fifteen years, that she wrote the above words concerning it in her will, which has been admitted to probate. The estate is valued at \$5,000 and is bequeathed absolutely to her niece, Mrs. Anna J. Hall, with whom she resided.

An Unprecedented Rainfall. WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—The unprecedented rainfall throughout the east and south is interesting the meteorologists of the United States, but thus far they have not found a satisfactory answer to their scientific inquiries as to the causes. The average rainfall for August in the vicinity of Washington heretofore has been less than four inches, but thus far this month more than twelve inches have fallen.

Three Spanish Ships Brought \$103. WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Three Spanish ships captured by Admiral Dewey in Manila Bay May 1, 1898, were sold by the navy department for \$103. These ships were the total cost of several Atlantic ports, the total cost of the bids were sufficient to cover the expense of advertising. The three ships are the Albat, Manileno and Mindanao. They have been stripped of everything movable and are simply old hulks, practically useless for any purpose of the navy.

Girl Is Saved by a Dog. Marysville O.—The watch dog of William Henderson saved the life of his 12-year-old daughter, Lottie Henderson. The child was attacked by an infuriated steer while playing in a shed. The animal had knocked the girl down with his horns and would have killed her, but the dog jumped at the animal's heels, which attracted its attention. The steer then turned upon the dog, which seized its nose, and Miss Henderson escaped with several slight bruises and a few wounds. Her clothing was all torn from her body.
